LONDON, December 3.—The belief held a little while ago PIPE ORGAN IN that the Government would before Christmas introduce a bill for the establishment of self-government in Ireland is not likely to be fulfilled, says the Daily Telegraph.

The cabinet committee appointed to deal with the draft of the new measure is still engaged upon the difficult question of Indian finance and as the bill cannot be ready for another fortnight at least, the opinion now prevails that time will not be available for settlement of the Home Rule problem until next session.
