ATTENDANCE IN SCHOOLS

Prince Rupert Ninth Among High
Schools of Province and Seventh
for Public Schools

In High School population
Prince Rupert, with an enrolment
of 213, came ninth among the cit-
ies of the province last year while
in public school enrolment with a
total of 877, this city was seventh.

Following were the cities that
had larger elementary school popu-
lation than this: Vancouver, 29-
369; Victoria, 4,914; New Westmin-
ster, 2,801; North Vancouver, 1-
456; Trail-Tadanae, 1,223; Nanai-
mo, 1,026.

The following had larger High
School attendance: Vancouver, 6-
163; Victoria, 1,240; New Westmin-
ster, 871; North Vancouver, 377;
Chilliwack, 298; Kamloops, 262;
Nelson 220.
