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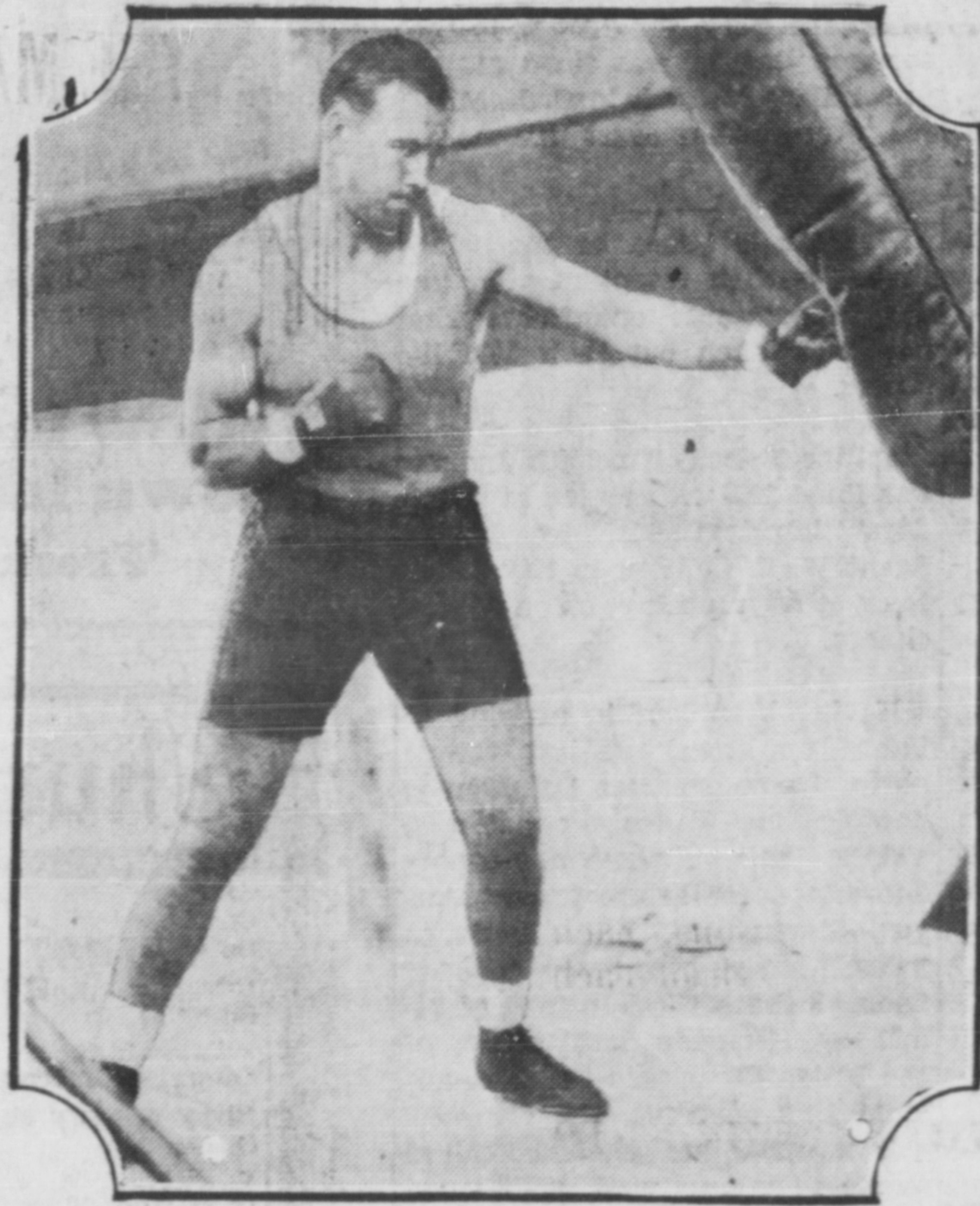

ESKIMOS IN LEAD

Played Exciting Two-all Draw with Buckaroos Last Night

SEATTLE, Jan. 31.—Their tremendous fighting ability enabled the Seattle eskimos to turn a two-to nil lead which the Portland Buckaroos had at the end of the second period in last night's Pacific Coast Hockey League into a two-all tie which ten minutes overtime failed to break. It was probably the most exciting game that has been seen here this season and a huge crowd of Seattle puck fans virtually went wild during its latter stages. It was considered a fine performance for the Eskimos as it was their third game of the week. They had played a Vancouver Monday and at Portland Thursday.

The first goal was well executed by Downie in the first period on a pass from Jimmy Evans. Loui Coupe made the second for the Buckaroos in the second period. It was a fluke which bounded off Jack Walker's stick into the net.

It looked like the Buckaroos had it on ice when the third period opened, but the Eskimos, skating hard, virtually laid siege to the Portland goal. Taking any sort of a shot of a shot they could get their sticks on, they worked Andy Akenhead, Portland goalie, continuously. Bobby Thomas finally scored as the Seattle fans night went crazy. Akenhead continued to save well as a hundred shots were made at his goal, the game being concentrated on Portland ice. As the Eskimos continued their brilliant battle, Bobby Connors, who had just been put in after having been out of the last two games on account of a bad knee scored the equalizing goal.

Continuing their tremendous efforts, the Eskimos were unlucky not to break the deadlock during the remainder of the third period and the overtime session. Akenhead, constantly assailed, made many great saves. His escapes night gave the fans heart failure.

The draw result places the Eskimos at the top of the league with 23 points, while the Vancouver Lions have 22 points and the Buckaroos, 21. The Pacific Coast race is indeed an exciting one and it looks like it may take the final game to decide the honors.

In Prince Rupert

January 31, 1911.

Fifteen of the new stations along the line of the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway, just east of Prince Rupert, have been officially named. They are Sockeye, Tye, Essington, Skeena City, Phelan, Kwinita, Kosiks, Salvus, Hubert, Exstew, Shames, Lakelse, Kitsumkalum Eddy and Copper River.

A new innovation in Atlantic shipping will be entering into service next summer of a 11,000 ton "motor boat" which will run between New York and Libau, Russia. The vessel, now under construction on the Clyde for the Russian-American Line, will have accommodation for 1,600 passengers and 8,000 tons of freight.

British Columbia coast packers, in preparation for the coming season this year which is expected to be better than that of 1910, have spent over \$1,500,000 for equipment and supplies.

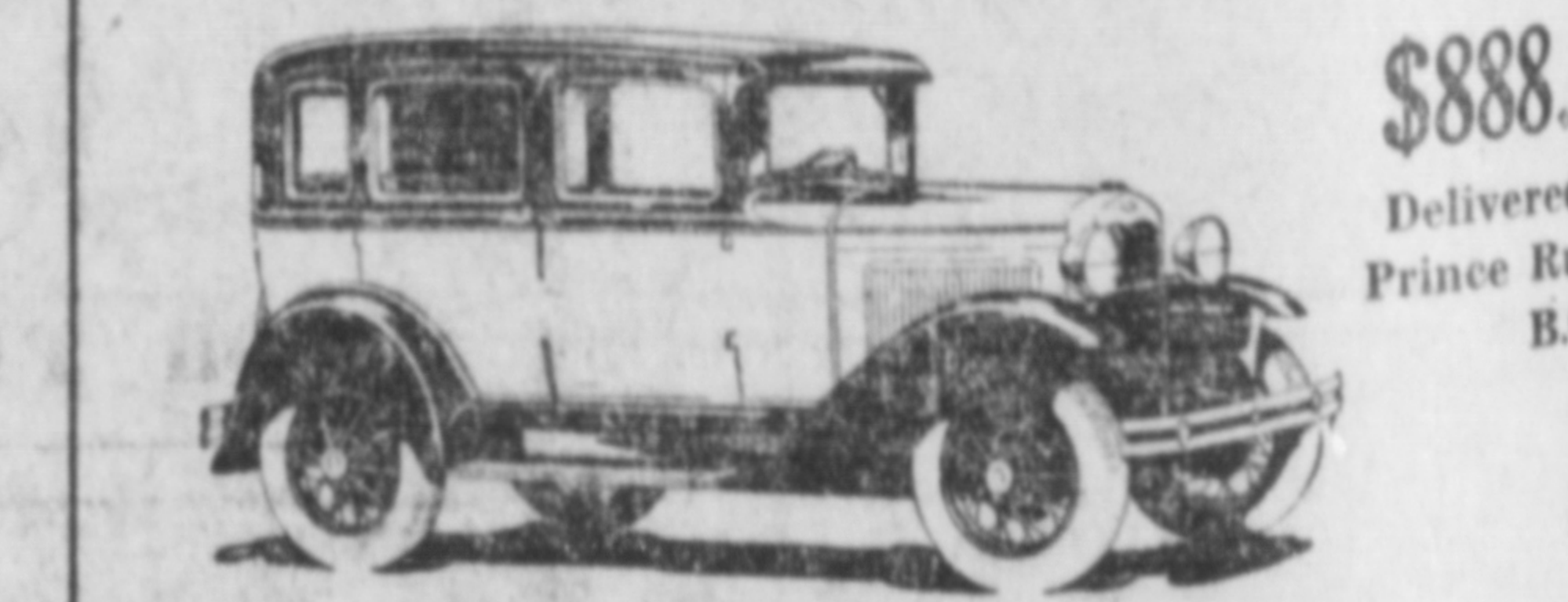
