COAL ORDER IS AWARDED

Albert & McCaffery Given Business By School Board

The school board last night gave the order to Albert & McCaffery for the supply of fifty tons of Nanaimo-Wellington mine run coal at \$9.90 per ton for Borden Street School and ten tons of Nanaimo-Wellington sacked lump coal at \$11 for Seal Cove and Westview Schools.

The tenders were as follows:

C. C. Ketchum—Bulkley Valley mine run, \$9.25; Bulkley Valley lump, \$9.75; Bulkley Valley sacked, \$10.20; Mine Head lump, \$11.50.

Prince Rupert Feed Co.—Casidy-Wellington mine run, \$10.50; Edson lump, \$12.

Albert & McCaffery—Nanaimo-Wellington mine run, \$9.90; Telkwa mine run, \$9; Nanaimo-Wellington lump, \$11; Telkwa lump, \$10.50.

Casey Cartage—Bulkley Valley mine run, \$10.20; Nanaimo-Wellington washed pea, \$8.50; Bulkley Valley-Nanaimo Wellington combination, \$9.35; Jasper hard, double screened, \$11; Bulkley Valley lump, \$10.75.

Philpott-Evitt—Nanaimo-Wellington mine run, \$10.25; Telkwa mine run, \$10; Nanaimo-Wellington lump, \$12.60; Bulkley Valley lump, \$11.10; Foothills, sacked, \$12.50.

Mr. Ketchum was present at the meeting and spoke briefly, urging the board to give Telkwa coal a chance. He strongly recommended this coal and offered to give the board a ton-load trial.

CHAIRMAN RETIRING

Mrs. T. M. Spencer Will Not Seek Re-Election to Board of School Trustees

Mrs. T. M. Spencer, member of the board of school trustees for four years and for the last two years chairman, intimated at last night's board meeting that she would not seek re-election to the board following expiry of her term next month.

In making the intimation to this effect, Mrs. Spencer voiced appreciation to the principals present at the meeting for the co-operation they had accorded her during her service on the board. She hoped and believed that the work would be carried on in the future as smoothly and harmoniously as it had been during her four years on the board.

In a brief reply, D. H. Hartness, principal of King Edward High School, expressed appreciation on behalf of himself and the other principals for the splendid manner in which Mrs. Spencer had carried out her office. Her attitude had always been sympathetic and helpful and her decision to retire from the board was much regretted.

least, of the numerous cases of undernourishment. The presence of decayed teeth is a real menace to a child's health, and it would seem to me that some step should be taken by the school board to impress upon the parents the need for proper dental hygiene.

"Next to teeth you will notice that defective tonsils are the chief offenders, and perhaps a word of explanation would be advisable here. It is obviously impossible for a school doctor to find out to what extent a child's health has been suffering from disturbances which might be traced to tonsils, without talking to the parents. For this reason any tonsils which looked at all suspicious have been reported. In the hope that the parents would take the question up with their family physician and ascertain if the tonsils are at fault.

"The High School pupils are, on the whole, very healthy. The sudden drop in the incidence of defective teeth and tonsils means that the periodic health examinations of the past have produced results.

"In closing I should like to make two recommendations. First, I have found that a great many of the children show evidence of poor lung expansion, and I believe that breathing exercises practised daily in the class rooms in both Public and High Schools would produce beneficial results. Secondly, in the course of the examinations two active cases of chicken pox were discovered attending school, also several cases of scabies or itch, and some of acute bronchitis running a temperature. It is obviously impossible to expect the teachers to detect these cases, but it is just as obviously desirable that our children should not be exposed to these various infections unnecessarily. To that end, I would urge the appointment of a full-time school nurse, just as soon as the funds are available. This would supply a check of infectious diseases breaking out in the schools and the nurse could also follow up the recommendations sent to the parents each year and see that they are acted upon."
