Robbed of \$115 in Cash and \$40 in Checks By Two Bandits Who Held Him Up as He Entered His Garage; Unconscious in Hospital

VANCOUVER, Dec. 7:-Louis Rosenbaum, president of the Vancouver Dressed Beef Co., is in an unconscious condition in the Vancouver General Hospital as a result of being shot through the stomach by a bandit at the rear of his home on West Twelfth Avenue at 2 o'clock this morning when two men took \$115 in cash and \$40 in checks from his pocket. Rosenbaum was returning home when, as he was about to enter his garage, the two bandits came up in another car.

CHICAGO, Dec: 7-Eighty-six awards in all were won by Canadian farmers at the International Livestock Show and Grain Exhibition which was held here last week.



A Curious Invention for Recovery of Treasure

Using a curious steel diving stairway invented by Simon Lake, the submarine builder and inventor, a group of men headed by Capt. H. H. Railey, representative of Admiral Byrd on antarctic expedition, will make a daring effort to recover some of the treasures lost to the world when the steamship Lusitania went to the bottom of the Atlantic ocean on May 7, 1915. At the lower end of the five-foot steel tube or "stairway," is an observation chamber from which a diver could descend on to the wreck and conduct his investigations with aid of powerful lighting rig.
