

RUPERT ON RUN AGAIN

Capt. Dan Donald Brings Veteran Ship North This Week

VANCOUVER, May 12—SS. Prince Rupert, one of the veterans of the Canadian National Steamships' Pacific Coast fleet, arrived in Vancouver on Sunday afternoon after her complete overhaul at Yarrow's in Victoria and last evening took her regular place on the northern run to Prince Rupert, Stewart and Anyox, sailing at 8 o'clock. Captain Dan Donald, Commodore of the fleet, is on the bridge.

On her arrival at Vancouver the ship presented a much changed appearance. The height of her funnels has been considerably reduced and about 15 feet has also been taken off her masts.

Col. J. C. Brown, Pacific Coast manager, made an inspection over the week-end and expressed himself as much pleased with her general appearance and performance since being recon-ditioned.

SS. Prince Rupert is replacing ss. Prince George on the north run, the latter ship being withdrawn for annual spring cleaning previous to the opening of the summer schedule early in June.

The week-end gave the waterfront quite a Canadian National appearance as all three of the larger ships, Prince Henry, Prince David and Prince Robert were in port, in addition to ss. Prince Rupert, ss. Prince George and ss. Prince John, the latter sailing late Sunday for the north.

OLSEN IS CONVICTED

Accused in Local Razor Affair is Found Guilty at Assizes

It took the jury at the Supreme Court Assizes yesterday afternoon only a few minutes to return a verdict of guilty of wounding with intent to maim against Charles Olsen in connection with an affray in this city last fall when Warren Scott was slashed with a razor. Mr. Justice W. A. Maedonald, the presiding judge, reserved sentence until this morning.

At the conclusion of the Olsen case, the last on the criminal docket, His Lordship excused members of the petty jury panel from further attendance at this session of the court. The judge, in dismissing the jury, stated that he wished to thank its members for their prompt attendance at court on this occasion.
