Four Dead and Several Wounded Since Opening of 1931 Shooting

VICTORIA, Oct. 26.—Four fatalities and three cases of men being wounded have been one result of the hunting season in British Columbia to date this year it was revealed at the headquarters of the Provincial Police here. Two hunters accidentally shot themselves, and two others died in mishaps in which other parties held the gun that went the list of injured by firing, unwittingly, into a hidden cache of

On the opening day of the season, September 15, Orin H. Plumb of Canyon was mistaken for a deer and his arm shattered by a bullet. About a week after the opening, on September 20, David Marshall, of Cumberland was killed by the accidental discharge of his own gun. Another seven days elapsed, and John H. Bornie of Smithers died as a result of the accidental discharge of a weapon in the hands of a hunting

On October 10 last Marcus Mc-Abee, of Ashcroft, was killed while hunting, under circumstances under review in the courts. Dynamite Recoil

Two youths, Earl Batt, 18, and John E. Geddes, 19, of Prince Rupert p hunted most of the day in the woods near the Kaien Island Highway on October 4. Towards evening they set up a target on a tree to practise upon. Their bullets found a hidden cache of dynamite under the tree, and the resulting explosion knocked both hunters down, one with painful injuries to his face from flying splinters.

Last year, thirteen deaths, it is understood, were reported in British Columbia woods as a by-product of the hunting fervor.

Provincial game laws make it incumbent on the hunter to see the horns of a male deer before firing.
