UNEMPLOYMENT ON THIS COAST

Several Thousand Already Out of Employment and Number Increasing.

(Special via G. T. P. Telegraphs.)
OTTAWA, Dec. 5.—The general question of unemployment during the present winter is engaging the attention of the Government. As a matter of fact the part of the Dominion in which there is serious unemployment is British Columbia. In the coast cities it is estimated that there are several thousand out of employment and that with the gradual diminution of work in the shipyards that number is being increased.

This brings up another national problem. During the war Canada embarked on a shipbuilding program which initially called for the construction of 55 vessels of an average tonnage of about 5,000. As a consequence a capital, estimated to total \$47,000,000 has been vested in thirteen yards on the Atlantic, Pacific and Great Lakes, and at the present time upwards of 20,000 persons are employed while the number of people dependent upon that employment total something like 17,000.

Loughheed, mill superintendent; A. A. Ewart, manager; F. Cartwright, E. Hudson, A. D. Gray and G. Campbell, the last mentioned acting as floor manager.

At midnight abundant and dainty refreshments were served by the dining room staff in charge of Chef Quayle, assisted by Mrs. Atkinson and Mrs. Golden. During the supper interval Mr. Greenwood sang two comic songs which were much appreciated. At 2 o'clock a line of cars provided by the millmen, appeared to take the city guests home.
