## NEW ROADS BUILDING

Further Areas in British Columbia Being Opened up To Tourist Travel

British Columbia is launching an extensive road building program, designed to improve her existing systems and to open up to the automobile tourist hitherto inaccessible regions in the interior, says the National Revenue Review. In all nine projects have received the serious consideration of the Provincial Government and work has already commenced on several.

Chief among the projects already under way is the new Trans-Canada highway, which will run from Victoria north to Nanaimo, on Vancouver Island, and from Vancouver, on the mainland, to the Alberta boundary, via Kamloops, Revelstoke, and Golden. Between the latter places, a gap of 183 miles, following the "Big Bend" of the Columbia river is being constructed, and the route will be improved along its whole length.

Work has also commenced on a short stretch of highway, along the

north bank of the Fraser river between Agassiz and Haig, which parallels the Trans-Canada and provides an alternative route for motorists. Work will also start immediately on a new road to the United States boundary which will connect Vancouver with the Peace Arch at Blain. The new route will be shorter than the existing one via New Westminster and Pacific Highway, and will be partially new construction.

Another project likely to be proceeded with is the Southern Trans-Provincial Highway from Hope through the Hope mountains to Princeton and thence to the Crow's Nest Pass. From Hope to Princeton, the route, all of which is laid out and a 30-mile stretch south of the latter point completed, describes a great semi-circle to the south reaching its highest point in Allison Pass at an altitude of 4,200 feet.

### Northern Roads

Another route, crossing the province in the north, is also included in the program. On this Northern Trans-Provincial Highway, new construction is contemplated east of Prince Rupert, west of Hazelton and east of Prince George.

In the interior, the program provides for the construction of a new highway up the North Thompson

son to Jasper; general improvements to the Cranbrook-Golden road, and to the Cariboo road from Spences Bridge, Thompson river north to Prince George.

Coastal projects contemplated are the continuation of the West Coast road on Vancouver Island, west of Jordan River and the construction of the Uclulet-Tofino road further north. On the mainland construction of the remaining links necessary to give Vancouver road connection with Powell River is expected.

## ADDRESS ON EVOLUTION

Dean Gibson Heard at Rotary Luncheon Yesterday Afternoon

Declaring that the Bible account of creation was not opposed to the evolution theory but that they fitted in nicely one with the other, Very Rev. J. B. Gibson, Dean of St. Andrew's Anglican Cathedral, gave an intensely interesting address on evolution to the Rotary Club at its weekly luncheon yesterday afternoon.

The Dean spoke of the controversy that had taken place over evolution. New truths were hard to get into the minds of men. He reminded his hearers that the earth was originally thought to be flat and then it was discovered that it was round but people were slow to believe it. Today it was an accepted fact.

Darwin did not appear to have had the idea that the evolutionary theory was opposed to the Biblical account. It was Darwin's successors who brought out the idea more forcibly and even today the idea seemed to be prevalent that the evolutionary theory and the Bible account could not be reconciled.

Dean Gibson then went on to point out that the six days were undoubtedly six periods, not necessarily 24-hour days. The order of development as set out by evolutionists was the same as that given in Genesis. The nebular theory was that the earth was once a part of the sun, that it had been thrown off as a vaporous mass and gradually solidified. The crust was formed but the interior of the earth remained at an intense heat.

### Process of Evolution

Light was the first thing created, it being the unifying force binding the proton and the electron together. The atmosphere came second. Then the seas were formed and the dry land, lower forms of life came into being and plants, crustaceans, fishes, amphibians, birds and animals followed in order. Finally man became a conscious being.

Various theories accounted for the beginning of life. One was the mechanical theory that conditions were such that life began spontaneously but the generally accepted idea was that there was a vitalizing force which brought forth the spark of life. This force was what men called God. "In the beginning God" There must be a supreme mind to bring about such a wonderful creation.
