## RESCUE PLANE ARRIVES HERE TODAY AND WILL RETURN

## California Flyers Trying Non-Stop Hop From Japan to Puget Sound Were On Desert Island

Naval Radio Station Picks Up Message From Russian FORESEES
Steamer and Transmits It to Seattle—Relieved Steamer and Transmits It to Seattle-Believed on Board Shp

SEATTLE, Sept. 16.—Cecil A. Allen and Don Moyle, Calfornia flyers, who had been missing for more than a week after attempting a non-stop flight in the plane "City of Tacoma" from Japan to Seattle, were safe on an uninhabited island, according to a message received today by the coastguard here from the naval radio station at St. Paul Island in the Behring Sea. The message was sent from the Russian steamer Buriat, which presumably picked the fliers up.

News of the safety of the flyers arrived just after an aerial search got under way yesterday afternoon when Clayton Scott and Roy French took off for Alert Bay. They expected to reach Ketchikan today but will be intercepted as soon as possible and instructed to return here.

Rescue Pilot Clayton Scott and his mechanic, Roy French, arrived here a few minutes after 1 o'clock this afternoon from Alert Bay. They were immediately informed by the Daily News that Moyle and Allen had been found. On receiving this information, Pilot Scott stated that he would wait here pending confirmation of this report and receipt of instructions from Seattle. "I suppose we will be turning back from here," Pilot Scott said.

The rescue plane is a fine double-winged Keystone-Loening four-place amphibian machine, being the first machine of its type to be seen in Prince Rupert. It is equipped with a 300 h.p. Wright Whirlwind engine and belongs to Pilot Scott.

It took 61/2 hours flying time for the plane to reach here from Seattle, last night having been spent at Alert Bay.
