Is Re-Elected League Head

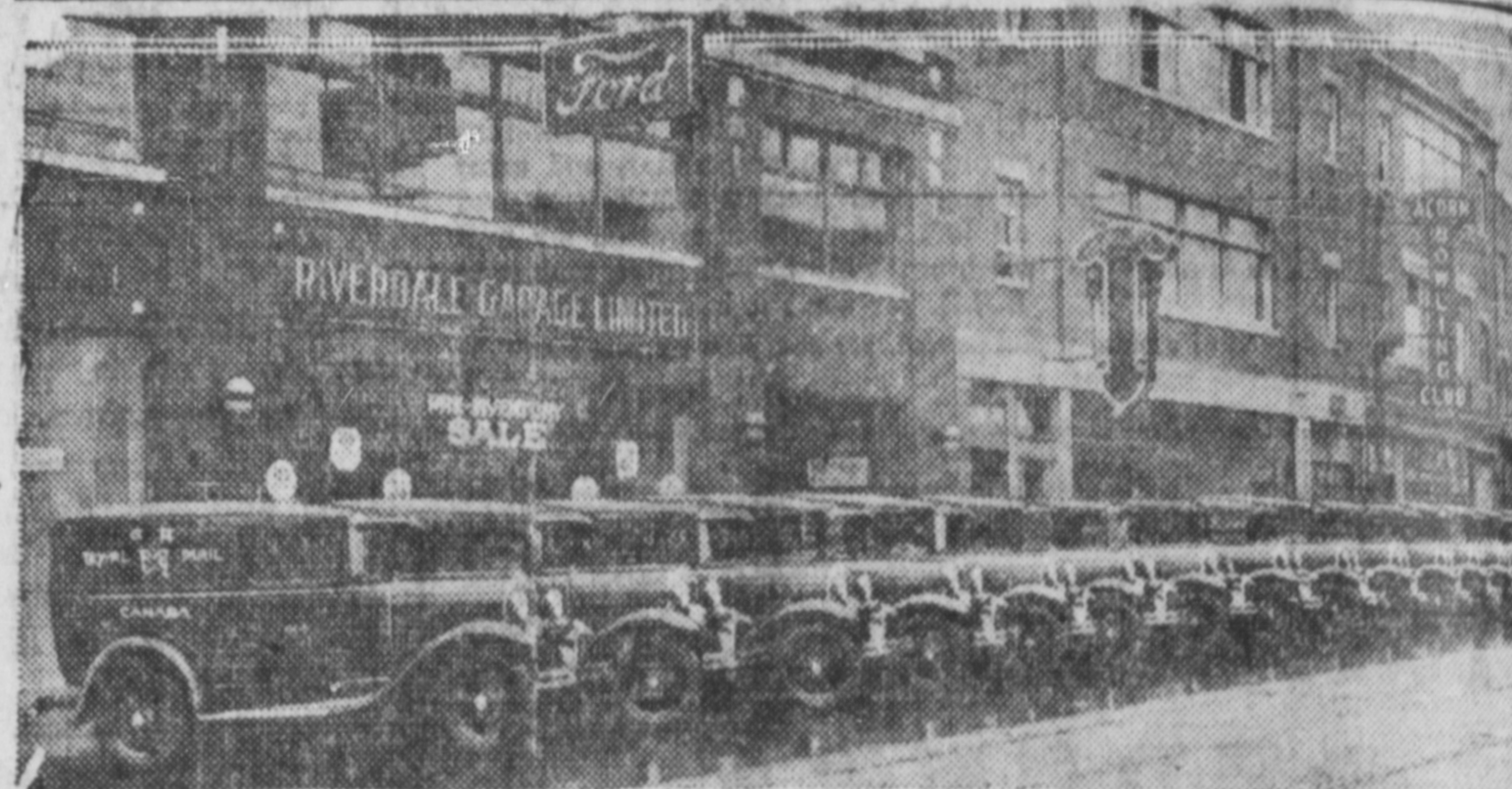
Harry Williams Still Leader of Pacific Coast Baseball Circuit—Draft Discussed

Provincial Constable E. G. Dangerfield returned to the city on the Catala last evening after having spent a vacation in Vancouver and Victoria.

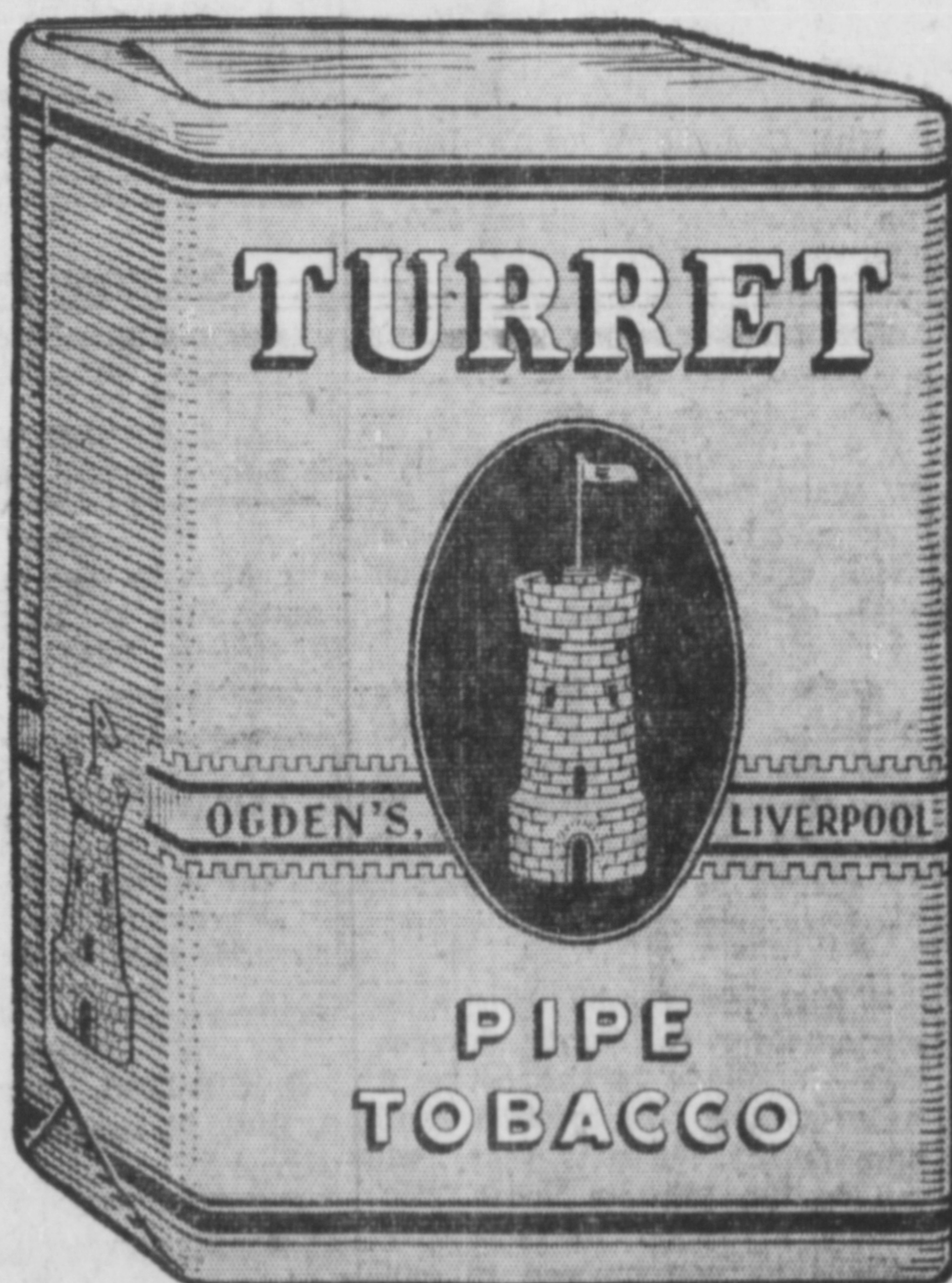
Ford Fleet Carries Royal Mail
