The annual banquet of the association was set for March 10, the twenty-first anniversary of the incorporation of the city. G. W. Johnstone, retiring president of the association, presided over the meeting.

IS NOT MERE MINING MAN

The new 17-car steel barge, which was built at the local dry dock, has now gone into service of the Canadian National Railways between Port Mann and Victoria. With the addition of the new barge, the Canadian National will have a daily barge capacity on this route of 77 cars.
