WAS NOT TO BLAME

Prince Rupert Sinking Last Spring Was No Fault of His, Declares Chief Engineer Boyd

VANCOUVER, Aug. 28:-Denial that any fault of his had caused the sinking of the steamer Prince Rupert at Esquimalt last March was voiced by Herbert H. Boyd, former chief engineer, at the marine inquiry into the mishap yesterday.

It was through the insistent demands of Chief Engineer Boyd, who, first officer, third officer, two fireficers are seeking reinstatement.

Captain's Suggestion

Suggestion that the Prince Rupert sank while moored at Yarrows Esquimalt dock on March 6 because a . ballast tank was allowed to overflow through a sounding well into the stern of the ship and subsequent settling allowed water to flow into the vessel through open glory-hole ports, was made by Capt. Daniel Donald, master, at an opening of the inquiry.

Capt. Donald was asked to give his theory of what Capt. J. D. Macpherson, Dominion wreck commissioner, described as being "an extraordinary casualty."
