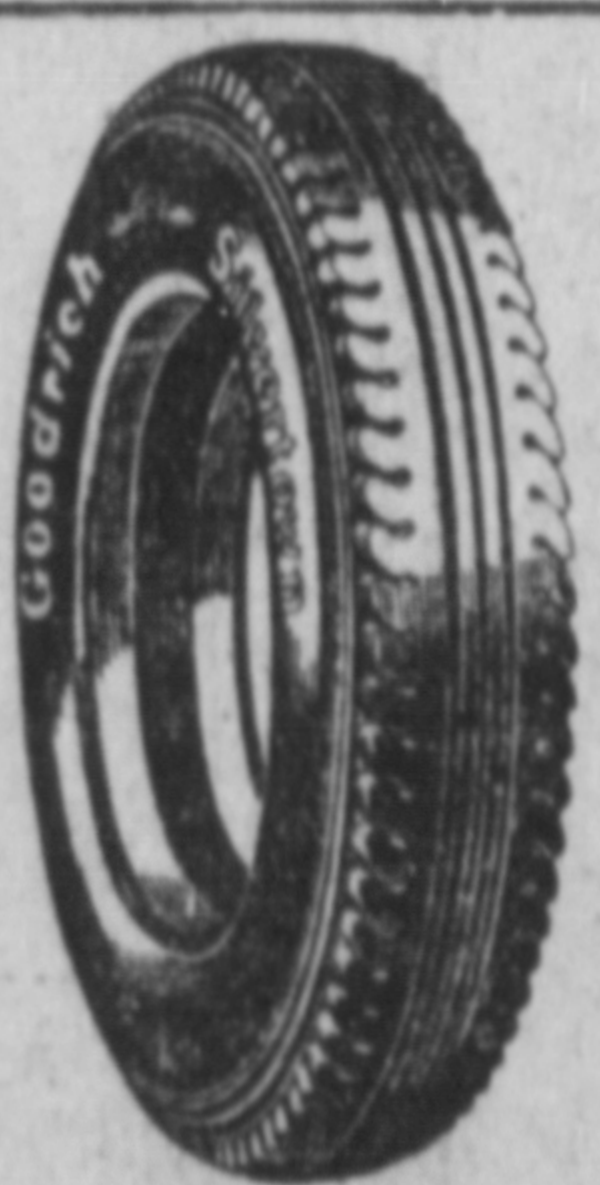

PEOPLE OF INTERIOR FRIENDLY

H. F. Pullen Tells of Recent Visit to Central B. C. and Good Time Spent There

Speaking to the Rotary Club yesterday and telling of a recent trip to the interior, Ald. H. F. Pullen said he found the people everywhere most friendly to Prince Rupert. It was quite a different feeling from what seemed to exist years ago when everybody seemed rather inclined to be critical. It was pleasant to meet people under such conditions. Incidentally he said he added a hundred new subscribers to the Daily News list.

One of the evils of the interior as in other places was that of political patronage. It caused a good deal of ill-feeling among neighbors and was the cause of more bitterness than anything else in the lives of the people. The smaller the place, the worse the trouble seemed. It was not a case of one party or the other but seemed to be a generally recognized condition.

Mr. Pullen touched on the recent convention at Burns Lake under the presidency of Andy Ruddy of that place. Of the ride to Ootsa Lake, of its pilgrimage through Vanderhoof to Prince George and of the wonderful manner in which he was entertained at each place he visited. He told of meeting former Prince Rupert residents such as Earl Fuller and Alex Young at Prince George, Doc Tomlinson and his wife at Smithers, and others at Hazelton and elsewhere. Everywhere he went he was treated splendidly, had a perfectly royal time and he suggested that other Prince Rupert people should more often visit the Bulkley and Nechaco Valleys and meet the people and still further increase the friendly feeling that existed.

INGENUITY OF BRITISH

JASPER PARK, Aug. 27.—The ingenuity of the British during the early days of the Great War was recalled here yesterday by Miss Hilda Pocock, of London, Eng., who was in charge of more than seven thousand women employees of a wartime munitions factory, near London.

Miss Pocock states that on one occasion when an expected supply of percussion caps for use in high explosive shells was lost at sea, the engineer in charge of production at the factory, borrowed a pill manufacturing machine from a patent drug company and, with minor alterations, produced a machine capable of turning out a sufficient supply of percussion caps.

The responsibilities of her war work were so great and the strain so terrific that Miss Pocock suffered a severe physical breakdown at the close of the war and was forced to spend two years in absolute quiet. She is recovered now, however, and is at present in Canada gathering material for a series of lectures, which she plans to deliver in England next winter. She is returning east from the Pacific Coast via the Canadian National Railways and is enjoying a brief rest at Jasper Park Lodge.
