JAPANESE PREMIERS ARE CHANGED

COMMUNIST AGITATORS IN VANCOUVER SENT TO PRISON

Sentence of One Year Imposed For Inciting To Riot and Sedition

Another Man Sent Over For Six Months For Uttering Seditious Words—Men Guilty of Manslaughter Receive Five Years

VANCOUVER, April 10:—Allan McEwen Campbell, Communist, was sentenced to one year's imprisonment at Okalla jail by Mr. Justice Denis Murphy in the Supreme Court of Assizes here yesterday on charges of inciting to riot and uttering seditious words. John Cunningham was sentenced to six months for uttering seditious words. Carmine Caradelli and George Sproat, convicted of manslaughter, were sentenced to five years each in penitentiary.

ZIMBALIST BEING SUED

Noted Violinist is Defendant in Suit For \$6,000 on Violin Deal

LOS ANGELES, April 9:—Efrem Zimbalist, noted violinist, is being made the defendant in a suit for \$6,000 launched by George Smith of New York, dealer in musical instruments.

Zimbalist purchased two violins valued at \$8,000, paying \$2,000 down but neglecting immediately to play the instruments. Upon trying them out, he claims that he came to the conclusion that they were not genuine instruments of old masters as had been purported. He refused to pay the remaining \$6,000 and the suit is the result.

VANCOUVER PROGRESS

1930 Greatest Year Industrially For Southern City—\$50,000,000 More Was Invested

VANCOUVER, April 10:—C. C. Browning, general manager of the Britannia Smelting Co., speaking yesterday, declared that in 1930 Vancouver had had the greatest industrial payroll in its history. The speaker declared that fifty new industries had been started in the city during the year and that \$50,000,000 of new capital had been invested.

The heart was placed back and every hope is expressed that the patient will recover.

NAPOLEON STEALS MARCH IN COURT FROM HERCULES

EDMONTON, April 10:—A man named Napoleon was awarded a court judgment here yesterday for \$1500 against another man named Hercules for injuries sustained when the latter bit his finger.

Harold Lloyd Under Knife

Famous Comedian Undergoes Operation For Appendicitis

HOLLYWOOD, April 10:—Harold Lloyd underwent an operation yesterday for chronic appendicitis. His condition is not serious. The operation was necessitated through failure of dietary treatment to remedy his trouble.

Lloyd was reported today to be making an exceedingly good recovery and suffering no ill-effects from the operation. He was 35 minutes on the operating table.

Demonstration Is Frustrated

Vancouver Still Having Trouble With Its Workless

VANCOUVER, April 10:—Police yesterday frustrated a demonstration of unemployed outside the Court House. The gathering was about to demand the release from custody of agitators who were coming up for sentence on charges of inciting to riot and sedition. Fourteen persons were sentenced at the Assize session.

ROTHSCHILD HAS PASSED

Former Great European Financier Died Yesterday In Paris

PARIS, April 10:—Baron S. Rothschild, former noted figure in the financial world of England and Europe, died here yesterday. Since the war, the great Jewish financier had not taken an active part in business.

NO REPORT ON PEACE

Olof Hanson inquired in House of Commons and Is Told Will Be Available Soon

A letter received in the city from Olof Hanson, M. P. at Ottawa says in part: "The Peace River outlet survey report is not at hand as yet, I asked the minister of railways on the floor of the House on Wednesday if he had it but he said he had not. However, he informed me later on that he expected it at any time now."

Mr. Hanson further told of having arranged for the Prince Rupert delegation to meet the Premier on April 15 and he hoped the report would be received before that time.

TRIBUTE TO LONGWORTH

Vancouver Province Lauds Dead Speaker of United States House

VANCOUVER, April 10:—The Vancouver Province paid editorial tribute yesterday to Nicholas Longworth, Speaker of the United States House of Representatives, who died in the morning at Aiken, South Carolina.

The paper declared that the late Speaker held such a place in the confidence of the people of the United States that he had been mentioned as a candidate for the presidency. The ability with which Mr. Longworth conducted his office, second only in importance to the President, was referred to by the Province.

WOMAN ASKS FOR PAROLE

Clara Phillips to Know Tomorrow Whether She Gets Her Freedom

SAN FRANCISCO, April 10:—Decision is expected to be made on Saturday in the application for parole of Clara Phillips, who murdered Albert Meadows and, after fleeing to South America, was finally captured and sentenced to life imprisonment. She has now served eight years.

Auto Hits Train; Five Are Killed

Tragic Collision Occurred Near Yakima Yesterday

YAKIMA, Wash., April 10:—Five high school students were killed yesterday when an automobile collided with a train near this city. The driver miraculously escaped with his life.

IS STILL CAPITAL

No Change to Be Made From Managua, President Announces

MANAGUA, April 10:—An official statement by the president of the republic yesterday announced that despite the recent earthquake disaster, Managua will be maintained as the capital of Nicaragua.

HOOVER AS CANDIDATE

President Hoover will start a series of radio addresses on April 13 in the course of which he will explain the achievements of his administration.

NEW YORK, April 10:—Zara Aga of the Turk who claims to be 157 years of age, is going home because he is homesick for his native land. He has been spending the last year or so in the United States. The ancient Turk has survived five wars and eleven marriages.

PREMIER RESIGNS

Hamaguchi Quits in Japan and Will Be Succeeded By Wakasuki

TOKYO, April 10:—Premier Hamaguchi, who is fighting for his life after being shot, is to resign as head of the government. His successor, it is announced, will be Ambassador to England Wakasuki, who took a prominent part in the London naval conference last year. Wakasuki is a former premier himself.

Hamaguchi underwent a second abdominal operation last night.

CONTAINERS DISCUSSED

Alaska Mill Men Want Timber Boxes and Canners Fibre

JUNEAU, April 10:—Hearings on the Ziegler Bill for an increase in the tax on salmon unless the canneries use board containers was opened yesterday.

Lumber interests say the use of lumber is needed to aid the industry.

The canners say that fibre board containers are less expensive and declare their belief that the proposed tax would not achieve its purpose.

LEADER OF JEWS DIES

Death of Mrs. Rachel Goldbloom Will Be Mourned Throughout Province

The entire Jewish community of British Columbia will mourn the death which took place in Vancouver at 4:15 yesterday afternoon, after an illness of three years, of Mrs. Rachel Goldbloom, wife of William Goldbloom of this city and probably the best known and most esteemed Jewish woman in the province.

Born sixty-eight years ago in Poland, the late Mrs. Goldbloom had spent the most of her life in Canada and for years had lived in Vancouver, being in business in that city and for a while, up to a few years ago, here. Deceased was perhaps better known, however, as a Jewish leader in religious and other fields. The Rachel Goldbloom chapter, Hadassah, was named after her. She was active in charitable work.

Besides her widower here, the late Mrs. Goldbloom is survived by two daughters—Mrs. Geshaye of Vancouver and Mrs. Ripstein of Vancouver. There are four grandchildren—Horace Ripstein, Mrs. Rita Newbauer (Ripstein), Miss Coralie Ripstein and Miss Selda Ripstein.

The funeral will take place in Vancouver.

SICK OF DRY LAW

Women of Finland Ask President For Repeal of Prohibition

HELSINGFORS, Finland, April 10:—A petition signed by 100,000 women of Finland asks the president of the republic to take the necessary steps towards bringing about repeal of country's prohibition law. The petition will be presented to the president within the next day or so.

The women claim that prohibition has brought about demoralizing effects in the country and that it is favored only by fanatics and numerous bootleggers.

WILL CLEAN UP CHICAGO

Mayor Elect Anton Cermak Already Making His Plans

CHICAGO, April 10:—Mayor-elect Anton J. Cermak, who was sworn in yesterday, has already started a reorganization of city affairs. He states that he will clean out the City Hall and "make Chicago safe for the World's Fair in 1932." Already he has dismissed 2200 of ex-Mayor Thompson's appointees.

Cermak will have 12,000 positions in the city service to fill.

Unemployed In Germany Being Given Work Now

BERLIN, April 10:—Two hundred thousand of Germany's unemployed got work during the month of March and there are prospects of further improvement in the situation as spring advances.

GANDHI TO COME OVER

Indian Nationalist Leader May Pay Visit to United States This Summer

NEW DELHI, India, April 10:—While he is away from India this summer as sole delegate to the round table conference in London, Mahatma Gandhi, Indian Nationalist leader, may also pay visits to the United States.

When he goes to England, Gandhi says he will not wear his customary loin cloth but will, instead, don trousers. He is going to have nothing to do with fancy clothes or banquets, however, he says.

Workmen Hurt As Building Roof Crashes

BERKELEY, Cal., April 10:—Twelve men were either killed or injured Wednesday when the roof of a new building on the campus of University of California on which they were pouring concrete collapsed hurling them to the ground where they were buried in wet concrete, steel and debris of other sorts.
