BOARD HAS GATHERING

Various Matters of Interest Taken Up at Meeting in Terrace

TERRACE, May 8—There was a good turnout of members at the monthly meeting of the Council of Terrace Board of Trade on Tuesday night, J. K. Gordon presiding, and a large amount of routine business was got through. The secretary, Mr. Halliwell, under pressure, consented to remain in office for another month.

After a lengthy discussion it was agreed to support a resolution submitted by the committee on unemployment and relief of the Ministerial Association of Vancouver. The resolution asked for an enquiry into the fluctuations of employment in the province with a view to recommending a permanent policy with regard to unemployment. F. Nash and the Rev. H. T. Allen strongly supported the resolution and E. T. Kenney opposed.

Mr. Allen was appointed a delegate to serve on the committee. A recommendation from the economic committee in favor of the establishment of some system of national health insurance was deferred for consideration at the next meeting.

Mr. Hepburn introduced a discussion on the question of excessive loads on the public roads and the filling of ditches with logs and debris. This, too was deferred for future consideration.

Announcement of appropriations for trail work were given from the Mines Department. These included: Repairs to Chindemash Creek as far as Silver basin \$300; Repairs to North Fork of Chindemash Creek trail 200; Zymoetz (Copper) River trail 150; Trail from Kleanza Creek via "North West" group 250; Trail from Kleanza Creek trail to "Silver Chloride" mineral claim 100; Total 1000

A letter of thank to the department was ordered to be sent.

A letter was received from the Hon. R. W. Bruhn, minister of public work, accepting the invitation of the Board to a luncheon on the occasion of his forthcoming visit. Arrangements were left to the entertainment committee.

It was decided to support the proposal of Vernon Board of Trade to institute a provincial convention of Boards of Trade and Chambers of Commerce.

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GET BACK TO WORK

TERRACE, May 8—J. K. Gordon at the meeting of the Terrace Board of Trade Council on Tuesday voiced a strong appeal to the members with regard to the constant appeals to the government for financial assistance.

"We should impress upon everybody," he said, "the need for planting a few potatoes and vegetables and for keeping a pig or two so as to have a little stock laid up for the winter. It is time we stopped calling upon the government to help us. We want to look to our own responsibility and to meet our own needs. We have got to get back to that."

Mr. Nash: "It seems to me that the teaching of moral philosophy is very much neglected in our schools. That policy applies to the men who are leaders in our industry, who employ men while progressive days are with us and who pile up millions of dollars, but the moment that their products are not in demand they use that reserve to pay their dividends on unorganic money and cast the men who helped make it on the bread line. There is a responsibility just as much as it is the responsibility of every individual to work for his daily bread." (Applause.)
