YOUNGSTER IS WINNER

Ralph Wells Causes Sensation at Jasper Park Horse Races

JASPER PARK, July 3.—A nine-year old lad named Ralph Wells, stole the glory of the sixth annual field day of the Jasper Park Rodeo and Turf Club, and some of the hardest riding cowboys in the west were forced to bow before the superb horsemanship of the youngster. A splendid crowd of more than 500 attended the rodeo which proved so successful that the club officers have decided to stage a second event in August.

Young Wells, with an eye for opportunities that would have done credit to a veteran jockey, booted three horses home to victory in the three feature races of the day and he picked off the place position in a fourth event. His riding earned him the Kingsland Trophy, for the mile course, and the McDermid Cup, for the half-mile junior 14.2 and under. His outstanding ride was in the free-for-all when he was left at the post, but pulled his horse, Ruby up fast to go through the entire field of 14 and win by a length and a half.

The many visitors were most interested in the bucking contest which was won by Bert Long, on the notorious bronco, Dimples. Long defeated Phil Hagenson, Dan Bowen and Louise Joachim in the finals after six other prominent western riders had been eliminated.


