Chief of United States Steamboat Inspection Service Places Blame. For Harvard Disaster

SAN FRANCISCO, July 4:-The wreck of the luxurious coastal liner Harvard lost May 30 on Point Arguello was due to the unskillfulness. negligence and inattention to duty of its officers, according to findings handed down Thursday by Captain John K. Bulger, chief of the steamboat inspection service of the United States Department of Commerce. In the same decision the licences of three of the Harvard's of-To Convention ficers were suspended, Captain Lyle B. Hillsinger for four months, second mate, George P. McVicar for Anderson for 15 days. The findings ted at San Pedro by Steamboat In-Moody. The question of drunkenness aboard the Harvard before and after the wreck is discussed by the report and it was found that none of the officers of the liner were intoxicated at the time of the wreck.
