REDUCING WHEAT SURPLUS

Coincident with the final financial negotiations for the marketing of the 1931 crop comes word that the binders are out in the fields once more, and that the Manitoba harvest will be general by the middle of next week, says the Winnipeg Free Press. The crop was sown last spring with the general hope that by the time harvest came the general world situation would have been greatly ameliorated. Those hopes have been dashed, and it is apparent that Western Canada will have to tighten its belt for another year. The crop will be a light one, and we all know that this partial failure may prove to be the prairies' contribution to the reduction of the world wheat surplus which has clouded the markets now for two full years.

MORE THAN FIVE CENTS

Prices are ruinous, and it will take more than the five-cent bonus to set the western purchasing power upon its feet again, beneficial though that relief measure may be. The government has also arranged to finance a 35-cent-a-bushel payment to farmers who desire to continue the pool system of financing their wheat sales. This makes the first payment more attractive, and may be a distinct factor in the marketing of the 1931 crop. The main thing which all concerned in the business must recognize is that, at all costs, our wheat must be sold. There can be no prospect of a healthy marketing situation until both actual and paper surpluses and carryovers have been finally cleared away.
