At the inquiry of G. V. Wilkinson, the hospital board was informed by H. W. Birch, managing secretary, last night that nothing had yet been done regarding the proposed interview with the city council regarding isolation hospital affairs. It was suggested that the conference would be held in time to have a report for presentation to the board at its next meeting.

Reporting for the house committee at last night's meeting of the hospital board, W. M. Brown announced that the new lighting system for the operating room had arrived and would be installed soon. An order of blinds had been filled and necessary repairs to the Fifth Avenue entrance had been made. Certain fire-proof materials suggested by the provincial fire marshal, had arrived and leaks in the roof were to be rectified.

The hospital board, at its meeting last night, received report of a recent Workmen's Compensation case in which Carl Wohlin had received treatment to the extent of \$122.50, of which the Compensation Board would pay only \$30 on the grounds that the patient had received hospital treatment much longer than necessary. Dr. J. H. Carson, the attending physician, is taking the matter up further with the Compensation Board so the hospital decided to leave it on the table until next month's meeting.
