



DOUBLE TAXATION

Editor, Daily News:--

It was with much surprise that learned in your editorial last Saturday of your attitude towards taxation of buildings in your city, I was under the impression that this matter was brought to a show-

ago, when for some reason or other the same subject was in the air, and was made an election issue, but was so severely condemned, that one would scarcely expect to hear of it again, without some great change in our city development conditions having taken place, that would warrant bringing the matter forward again.

The imposition of such a tax would be the most retrograde step that this city has ever taken, would mean a bar to progress, it would mean that we would never have anything better than a shacktown business section, for who is going to pull down their old buildon Third Avenue between Fourth and Seventh Streets; should now be-done and replaced by substantial ones, knowing full well that on every dollar they spend they are going to be taxed. Anyone who has ever built themselves a home here, knows how much it costs to get anything decent, 'much more than in any other coast city, then you suggest aggravating this and incidentally penalizing progress, by imposing a building tax.

The imposing of a double tax is a very serious matter, and should not be done without the elector's sanction, therefore no sitting alderman has a right to retain his seat, if it is his intention to support a building tax this year, if such is his intention, and he is honest to the electors, he will resign, declare him self, and run again for office.

Thin End of Wedge

No matter how small the percentage taxed upon, it is a getting in of the thin end of the wedge, and in a few years, our taxes can easily be four or five times as heavy as they are, if such a system is allowed to be instituted, which although applicable in older, fuller and more evenly developed cities, would be absolutely out of place here, and a most serious setback to our development, a hard blow to the building trades, and in fact to every kind of business to some degree.
