As to the possibilities of navigation Mgr. Turquetil said Churchill had one of the finest natural ports in the world. There were ice-fields but no icebergs, and the port could be open for five or six months in the year.

"Two trains a week run out of Churchill, one carrying mail, so that nowadays we are only a few days from Montreal," the missionary said. He recalled that until a few years ago mail leaving Chesterfield Inlet or Pond Inlet for Monreal took a long time to answer. In fact, mail sent out one summer could not be answered until the following summer with the return boat trip. In the winter the mail service was more precarious, the mails being carried from post to post by Indians on their way to Le Pas and Winnipeg. In connection with the possibilities of the future growth of Churchill and district Mgr. Turquetil referred to the advantages of the railway, aeroplane and radio.

Away North

Churchill is more than 500 miles north of Le Pas, Man., and is now the episcopal seat of Mgr. Turquetil, who settled at the new railway terminus last summer after having ived at Chesterfield Inlet among the Eskimos for a long time. He has a modest house and a small place of worship at Churchill, the church accomodating 100 people. His diocese, or prefecture, as these sparsely populated regions are called, is bounded on the north by the Pole, on the south by Churchill, on the west by the Mackenzie River and on the east by the Atlantic Ocean, according to Mgr. Turquetil, it being known as the Hudson's Bay diocese. His pastoral flock consists of 6.600 Eskimos, who speak various dialects, and 1,500 Indians belonging to various tribes. When he is north of Churchill Mgr. Turquetil speaks neither French or English, but one or the other of the primitive native

All the mission posts are provided with a radio receptio nset, equipped with dry batteries, and every Saturday night everybody tunes in to get the latest news from the outside world. This is made possible through the courtesy of a company which manufactures radios.
