Is Sentenced to Jail For Stolen Goods Possession

Provincial police divisional headquarters here have been advised that George Sedalia Edding has been sentenced to three months' imprisonment by Stipendiary Magistrate R. W. MacGowan of Burns Lake for being in possession of stolen goods from the camp of the Consolidated Mining & Smelting Co. on the Emerald mine in the Ootsa Lake country. Edding's arrest and trial followed discovery of petty thieving at the Emerald mine as well as elsewhere in the district.

Edison Is on Verge of Coma Prior to Death

WEST ORANGE, N.J., Oct. 16.—Thomas A. Edison, the great 84-year old American scientist and inventor is now on the brink of a coma which will culminate in his death, his physicians stated last night. Mr. Edison has been gradually losing strength during the past several days.

Manslaughter Charge Is Laid

Norman Schreiber Ont on Bail Following Car Crash Last Week
 A technical charge of manslaughter has been laid at Burns Lake against Norman Schreiber of Grassy Plains as an outcome of a fatal car accident last week six miles south of Burns Lake, when P. L. Mulville, well known pioneer resident of Grassy Plains, was killed. Schreiber was the driver of the car, which was travelling from Burns Lake to Grassy Plains when the fatality occurred.
 The preliminary trial of Schreiber has been adjourned until after the completion of the inquest, and bail in the sum of \$10,000 has been granted, \$5,000 on accused himself with two sureties of \$2,500 each with A. M. Ruddy and H. J. Jewell as bondsmen.
