Foreign Minister of France Denounces New Treaty; Talk of War

Contrary to Spirit of Co-Operation—Germany Justifies Measure as Being Act of Defence Against Russia

PARIS, March 30:-Aristide Briand, foreign minister of France, yesterday denounced the customs treaty between Germany and Austria as being opposed to the spirit of co-operation in Europe. It was a measure which he declared would eventually result in war in Europe. He would continue to the bitter end to protest against the proposed treaty, Briand declared.

It is pointed out here that the measure is a defensive action against Russian goods. As such Germany feels that it should have the hearty support of the rest of Europe and, particularly, the United States.
