### Duty on Higher Price Cars is Increased Under Budget; Other Revisions in Post Rates Made

OTTAWA, June 2:-Although there is not a general revision, almost all tariff schedules are amended as regard certain items thereof in the budget of Premier R. B. Bennett which was presented to the House of Commons yesterday. The total number of rate bearing items included on the resolution is almost 220. Automobiles are divided,

—the first up to 1200 in value, no change; second, from \$1200 to \$2100, general tariff increased from 271/2% BROKERS to 30%; third, over \$2100, intermediate and general rates are increased from 30% to 40% respectively. Used automobiles are prohibited entry unless as settlers' effects.

Magazines and periodicals are made subject to a specific duty of 15c per pound under general tariff except those placed on the free list

by order-in-council. In revision of the tariff, the Premier announced changes affecting some 200 rate bearing items but the alterations were confined almost eral tariffs. The new imposts are penitentiary. expected to produce an additional \$78,000,000.
