Problem Arising Out of Unemployment Relief

While President Hoover's Conerence on Home Ownership still is fresh in thought there have come to notice two instances of a condiometimes places a penalty on home ownership, says an editorial in the Christian Science Monitor.

A woman in a Pacific Coast state whose husband, a carpenter, has had only a few days' work in many months, applied reluctantly at last to the county welfare board for aid. This couple owned a home which were property owners.

True, the county offered the man some work on the roads, but two weeks in these circumstances is a long time to wait for a pay envelope. Owners of a house were preumed to have resources, but they could not eat or wear the house. and if they used the rent from it for their own needs they would lose the home by foreclosure.

Deserve Consideration

Surely: if those who undertake the responsibilities of home ownership are valuable to a community; and there is no doubt that they are—their stability should entitle them to consideration in time of adversity. The case just described is almost duplicated by the experience of a New England family. Theirs is a three-family house. One suite is vacant. The second brings no income because members of that family, like themselves, are out of work. Again, official regulations stand in the way of aid. And taxes must be paid on the house.

Legislatures might well consider whether relief laws ought to draw such rigid lines against the person who, for all his ownership of a certain kind of property, may be in actual want. But laws and ordinances can hardly be changed at once. The many unemployment relief committees which have just raised or are raising funds by private contribution all over the United States can meet this exigency more readily than official bureaus. To them is commended as being especially meritorious the case of the family anywhere, that is trying, at the cost of adequate food and clothing, to hold its slender, mortgage-ridden thread of title to a home.

Charles Tupper, lasting from 1892 to 1896, Sir George continued to hold the finance portfolio.

Tasted Defeat

In 1896 the Conservative government went forth into the wilderness, where it remained for 15 years. Twice contesting seats in that period, once in Saint John, N.B., in 1900, and again in Northern Ontario in 1903. Sir George tasted political defeat. But in 1904 he returned to the House of Commons, sent thither by the constituency of North Toronto, Until his elevation to the Senate in 1921 he sat for this riding, not again courting the political favors of his native New Brunswick,

When the government of Sir Robert L. Borden succeeded that of the late Sir Wilfrid Laurier following the Reciprocity Election of 1911. Sir George was given the portfolio of trade and commerce.

During the Great War, Six George, with other members of the Canadian parliament, visited the Western Front. There they were conducted to a number of Canadian battalions in reserve positions, Si George delivering brief speeches of encouragement to the troops and meeting the officers. During 1916 he attended the allied economic conference at Paris, as one of the four representatives of the British government, and in that year he was appointed a member of the Imperial Privy Council-a distinction which carried with it the title of "Right Honorable."

Following the war, Sir George accompanied Sir Robert Borden to P. J. Ryan will sail tonight on the peace conference.
