MILL FOR WOODBINE

Hugh McGuire Says Negotiations Are Under Way For Riverside Plant

Woodbine Gold is negotiating for the Riverside mill, about seven miles from the Woodbine property, according to Hugh McGuire, managing director of Woodbine.

The Riverside mill was erected on that property, just across the Alaska-British Columbia border, at considerable expense and has been standing idle for some time. Tests of the Woodbine ores will be made in the mill and the concentrates shipped to Trail and Tacoma, if it is determined that the mill is suitable for treating ores found in Woodbine.

The managing director of Woodbine expects engineers from Salt Lake City, representing the eastern interests in the property, who will probably test the Riverside mill and start a surface and underground examination.

Ore tests will be made with ores from three known ore bodies on Woodbine, comprising gold ores, complex and medium types, revealed by diamond drilling, stripping and shaft work in the past two years.

THIS PORT AGREEABLE

Vancouver Paper Assumes Prince Rupert's Position Regarding Peace River Outlet

One of the misapprehensions regarding the Peace River outlet to the Pacific Coast to connect with a completed P.G.E. is the occasional suggestion from correspondents in Vancouver papers that Prince Rupert is bitterly and unalterably opposed to such development says the Vancouver Sun.

"The man who fears for the project because of opposition from Prince Rupert or any other north coast terminal does not know his country," says Noel Humphreys, civil engineer, who characteristically has given this angle the same attention and scrutiny as other and more important objections.

"There need be no fight as to whether Prince Rupert or Vancouver is to become the 'spout' through which the grain and other products of Peace River will ultimately pour."

"Anyone who makes the suggestion reveals his ignorance of the entire subject."

"He should know, and he would quickly know if he studied the map, that completion of the P.G.E. Railway and connection with Peace River, whether the connection is built by Pine Pass of Peace Pass or any other, means that the line from Peace River must meet and cross the main line of the Canadian National to Prince Rupert."

"For that reason an outlet for the Peace to Vancouver via the P.G.E. cannot be accomplished without automatically, and in fact first of all, providing the same connection to Prince Rupert via the Canadian National."

"What could be fairer or more fitting than that?" Mr. Humphreys comments.

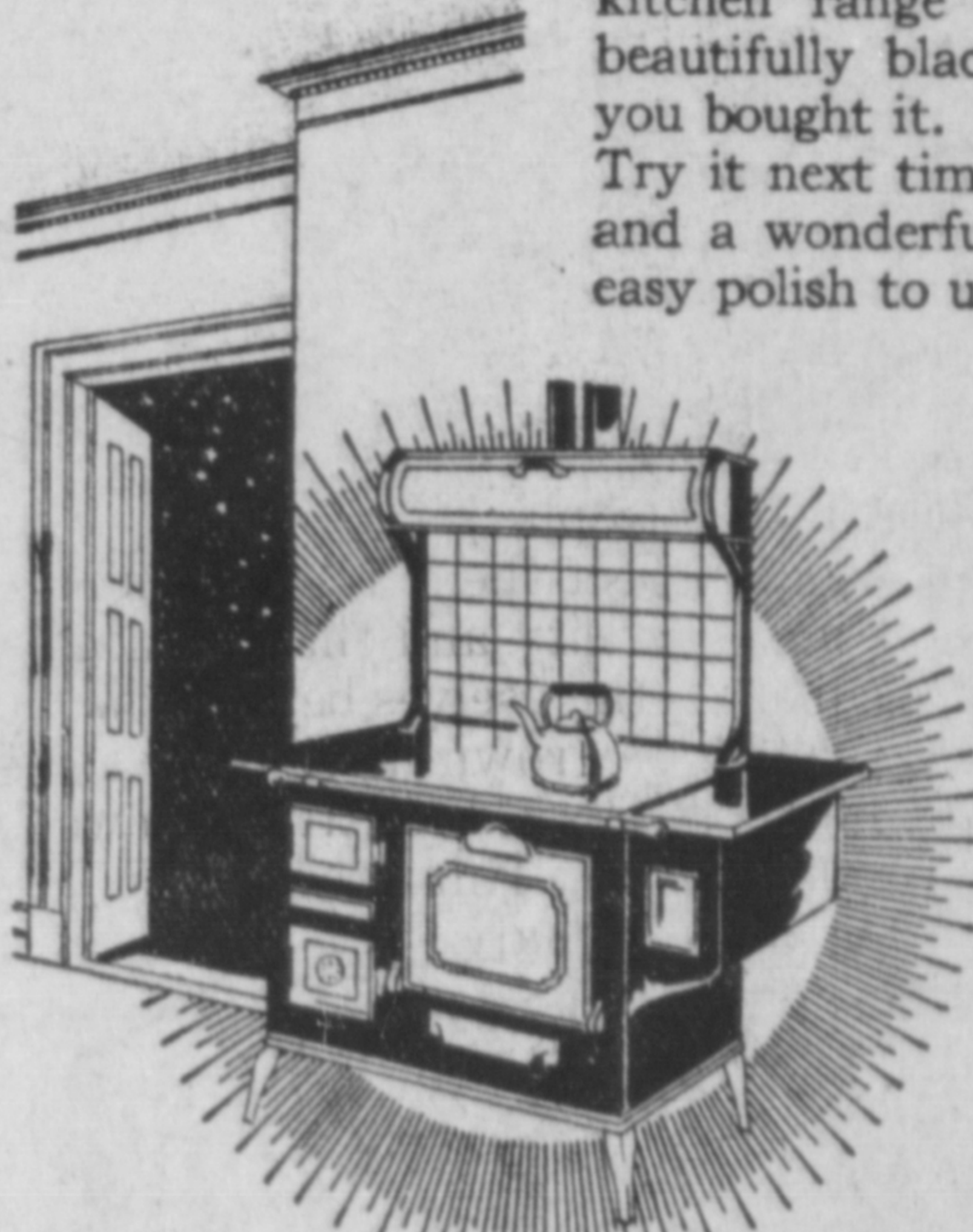
KEEP OUT DESTITUTE

Peace River Chamber of Commerce Suggests Legislation to Curb Undesirable Migration

POUCE COUPE, March 23.—The Pouce Coupe Chamber of Commerce feels that it is imperative that the provincial government should effect legislation at the present session to make impossible influx of undesirable destitute elements. A large majority of late settlers in the Peace River district speak little English and are totally without means.

Among one of the remedies suggested is the restoration of the old Dominion \$10 filing fee. It is also felt that, with the exception of Anglo-Saxons or naturalized Canadians, settlers should possess adequate means of sustenance for at least one year.
