Provincial Constable William Harrison returned to the city on the Prince George this morning from a brief trip to Vancouver. Constable Harrison is stationed at Port Essington for the summer.

Accompanied by C. Drew, a large party, representing the Sierra Club of San Francisco, was here Monday enroute south after having made the round trip to Skagway and other Alaska points on the steamer Prince Rupert.

There were 180 passengers on board the steamer Prince George this morning on her arrival from Vancouver enroute to Skagway. The large majority of these passengers are round trip tourists. About 25 passengers left the vessel here.

Capt. W. P. Armour, manager of the Pacific Salvage Co., returned to the city on the Prince George this morning after having accompanied Mrs. Armour and daughter to Drumheller, Alberta, where the former will remain for some time on account of her health.

C.N.R. steamer Prince Henry, Capt. H. E. Nedden, returning south after a regular voyage to Alaska with the largest list of tourist passengers for any single ship so far this year on board, arrived in port at 7 o'clock this morning from Skagway and sailed at 9:30 a.m. for Vancouver direct.

Neil McLean, arrived in port at 11:30 this morning from Vancouver, Powell River and Ocean Falls and will sail at 3 o'clock this afternoon for Skagway and other Alaskan points, whence she will return here south-bound next Monday morning.
