A new strike of ore has been made on the Moose property in the Upper Kitsault Valley at Alice Arm by J. Strombeck, pioneer prospector of that district. The ore is composed of galena, carrying silver-lead and zinc values. Ernest Unwin sailed last night The vein is five feet wide and can be traced on the surface on the Prince Charles for Port for over 1000 feet. Not enough work has been done to de-Cements whence he will proceed to termine the richness of the ore body but it is known that some of the ore is very high grade. Samples which have been brought in to Alice Arm show it to be very massive.
