At the mass meeting Thursday night there was a representative gathering, especially of fishermen. There might easily have been a much larger turnout of businessmen consider. ing the interests at stake.

On all vital matters the gathering was agreed. Ever proposal put before it, the meeting endorsed. They asked that the fishing be open to everyone and that the monopoly be broken. They also dealt with matters having to do with the protection of the fish.






