PUCK WAR CONTINUES

Rangers Have Four-Point Lead Over Black Hawks and Both Are Out on Top

NEW YORK, Nov. 23:-Continuing their battle for first place in the National Hockey League, New York Rangers and Chicago Black Hawks, as a result of last night's play, stepped out ahead of the rest of the circuit by winning respectively over Detroit Falcons and Montreal Maroons.

The Rangers defeated the Falcons 2 to 1 at home while the Black Hawks, also at home, downed the Maroons 4 to 2.

The Rangers have a four-point lead over the Black Hawks, who, in turn, are one point ahead of the third place Montreal Canadiens.


