Good Flight

Feat is Testimonial to Courage and Skill of Pilot Desmond Murphy

Late yesterday morning, Robert Quinn, operator at Echo Lake Cabin on the Yukon Telegraph trail, 100 miles north of Stewart, lay ill in his lonely cabin and in need of medical attention but facing the prospect of having to spend the winter at that desolate spot for lack of speedy enough transportation to hospital and doctor. Early last evening, scarcely five hours later, he was comfortably ensconced as patient in the Prince Rupert General Hospital where the necessary care and treatment will be freely accorded.

In that short space of time, the 250 or so mile distance had been spanned and aviation once again demonstrated its necessity and importance in the great and desolate distances of the north country.

Senator Robertson Agrees To Continuation For While Of British Columbia Work

OTTAWA, Nov. 10:—An understanding has been reached between Senator Gideon D. Robertson, federal minister of labor, and Hon. R. W. Bruhn, British Columbia minister of public works, which, if approved by the Dominion cabinet, will permit the British Columbia highway program of unemployment relief to continue "to a reasonable extent" for a further period of about four months.

Mr. Bruhn stayed behind in Ottawa, after Hon. J. W. Jones. British Columbia minister of finance, had failed in his endeavors recently, to plead with the federal government for a continuation of support for the B.C. program.
