ACTION IS DISMISSED

Carl Halvarson Fails in Damage Suit Against Brown and White

Mr. Justice W. A. Macdonald, at the Supreme Court Assizes yesterday afternoon, dismissed an action of Carl Halvarson against Joe Brown and William White for damages as a result of the plaintiff's young son, Theodore Halvarson, having been injured when run down on Eighth Avenue East on August 7, 1929, by a taxi car owned by Brown and driven by White. By consent of the defendants, each party will pay its own costs. Gordon Sloan of Vancouver was counsel for the plaintiff while W. E. Williams K.C. and T. W. Brown acted for the defendants.

Witnesses for the plaintiff were Dr. W. T. Kergin, Dr. Frank Patterson, Vancouver (transcript), Mrs. Augusta Halvarson, Anton Halvarson, Peter Doiron, Harold T. Bunn and Carl Halvarson.

MONTREAL, May 13:—The new conversion loan passed the \$200,000,000 mark this afternoon with subscriptions still pouring in from all parts of the country.


FUR SEIZURE IS QUASHED

Fred Wiggins of Southbank Succeeds in Certiorari Proceedings At Assizes

In certiorari proceedings in the Supreme Court yesterday, Mr. Justice W. A. Macdonald quashed a confiscation of some \$600 worth of furs which had been imposed, in addition to a fine of \$50, on Fred Wiggins, Southbank merchant, for violation of Game Act. Proceeds of the furs which were confiscated will be returned by the crown to the appellant. The conviction itself was not attacked.

T. W. Brown acted as counsel for Wiggins in the appeal while W. E. Fisher appeared for the crown.

GRAIN SHIP IS COMING

Ropner Line Vessel Heronspool Due This Afternoon to Load For U.K.—Continued

The Ropner Line steamer Heronspool, fourth grain boat to load this spring from the Alberta Wheat Pool's local elevator, is due in port about the middle of the afternoon. She was reported due at 1 p.m. at Triple Island where she was to take on her pilot, Capt. C. W. Wearmouth.

Soon after arrival in port, the Heronspool will move into the elevator wharf to start loading a full cargo for the United Kingdom or Continent. This vessel will, it is understood, clean up all wheat remaining in the elevator.

TURN DOWN BANK BILL

Australian Senate Rejects Measure Whereby Debts of Commonwealth Would Be Met

CANBERRA, Aust., May 13:—The Australian Senate overwhelmingly defeated the Commonwealth Bank Bill providing for the shipment of \$25,000,000 of gold reserve to London in June to meet debts due.

GOLD IN CARIBOO

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PREACHED IN PENITENTIARY

Rev. C. E. Motte of This City Takes Part in Impressive Service at New Westminster

Rev. C. E. Motte of Rupert East United Church, Prince Rupert, preached the special Mother's Day sermon in the British Columbia Penitentiary, New Westminster on Sunday last. The sermon was based upon the story of Rispah, taken from the Second Book of Samuel, dealing with the sorrow, love and devotion of a mother when trouble overtakes her children.

The service was in charge of the chaplain, and there were about 250 men present. At the door of the church there was a table with small sprays of flowers, beautifully arranged and contributed by the prison staff. Each prisoner as he entered was invited to accept a spray of flowers, and to wear it in memory of his mother.

The prison choir rendered a beautiful number entitled "Saviour, Tell Mother I'll Be There."

At the close of the service, Colonel Edgett, the warden, made an appeal to the prisoners to honor their mothers, by making a determined attempt on their liberation to live a new life.

In honor of the day, each man was given the opportunity of writing a special letter to his mother. The character of the service, and the contributions of the warden and his officers, combined to make a most touching appeal to their unfortunate charges, to higher and better things.

PRESIDENT OF FRANCE

Paul Doumer and Not Aristide Briand Elected to Succeed Doumergue

VERSAILLES, May 13:—Paul Doumer, 74 year old president of the Senate, was tonight elected the thirteenth president of France to succeed President Doumergue who is retiring.

Premier Aristide Briand, by virtue of an overwhelming vote of confidence in foreign policy accorded him by the Chamber of Deputies a few days ago, was expected, through additional prestige, to win the presidency but this did not materialize.

POSTAL DEFICIT

Rates May Have to Be Raised in United States

LAREDO, Texas, May 13:—Addressing a convention of postal employees here yesterday, Assistant Postmaster General Tilton predicted a postal department deficit for the present year of \$120,000,000 as compared with some \$90,000,000 last year. He predicted that it might be necessary to raise at least some of the postal rates.
