RUPERT MARKET OFFERED MORE THAN SEATTLE

Fish Boats Not Satisfied Here Take Less in Seattle.

Only two car loads of halibut were shipped from Prince Rupert last week. Thinking the price offered too low several of the large boats, left for Seattle with their catches. At that port they were offered still less.

The Volunteer was in yesterday with 25,000 pounds, which was sold at 11.9c and 8c to the Cold Storage.

The Vansee called with 90,000 pounds, but she sold only her deckload of 15,000 lbs. for 11.8c and 8c to the Cold Storage and cleared for Seattle with the rest.

The Canadian Fish & Cold Storage trawler Andrew Kelly arrived yesterday with 160,000 lbs. of trawl fish.

Sport Briefs

The return of the old rules in "dribbling" in the basketball game this year is receiving a good deal of adverse criticism. It appears that this new rule, or rather return of the old one, is now in vogue generally and has been inserted in the general rules. Now a player is allowed to dribble the ball with both hands for an indefinite distance where formerly the ball could only be held by a player for two steps and then must be dribbled with one hand.

This new rule takes away from the game a good deal of its skill and neatness and tends more to the cultivation of mere strength. Combination is practically killed and the players cannot keep their positions so well. An example of this happened during the game between the Drydocks and the Sons of Canada on Friday evening. Anderson and Currie of the Sons were checking Clementson who had the ball. Clem was dribbling with both hands and Anderson went in to take the ball away and the impact of rushing to meet the big fellow made him run directly into his own team mate.

The winter sport season can be said to have fairly begun now. With last week's cold there was plenty of skating at the Salt Lake. After this present soft spell Morse Creek will flood so that it can be used for skating. The dam is ready and all that is needed is that it fill up before the next cold spell and more cold may be expected before long.

With a rink in town it is quite likely that some of the local hockey enthusiasts may engage in a few games. Hockey is going right ahead at Hazelton and other points up the line and although there have been no inter-town games the local teams have been having been getting in a lot of good practice.

The Whist League has been having its regular Wednesday meets. There is a good deal of interest being taken in the progress of the games and it is very hard to say who will win the Dyb-havn Cup. The Oddfellows and the Sons of Canada are now in the lead, with the St. Andrew's one game behind. There will be no more games until January 15.

Over the Christmas season the various games will be dropped, probably, for a while, but it is expected that the sport will begin in real earnest early in January.

Work is proceeding on the dressing rooms and gymnasium at the Exhibition Hall and the Athletic Association will be ready to start classes there after the first of January.

JESS WILLARD IS A PROFITEER SAYS FEDERAL WARRANT

KANSAS CITY, Dec. 13.—A federal warrant charging profiteering in the sale of cord wood has been issued against Jess Willard, former heavyweight champion, by the United States district attorney for Kansas.

It is alleged that Willard asked Andrico \$3 a cord for wood stumpage on his farm near Topeka, an amount the district attorney asserts is double what it should have been.

Synopsis of Land Act Amendments

Minimum price of first-class land reduced to \$5 an acre; second-class to \$2.50 an acre.

Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-timber land.

Partnership pre-emptions abolished, but parties of not more than four may arrange for adjacent pre-emptions with joint residence, but each making necessary improvements on respective claims.

Pre-emptors must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 5 acres before receiving Crown Grant.

Where pre-emptor in occupation not less than 5 years, and has made proportionate improvements, he may, because of ill-health, or other cause, be granted intermediate certificate of improvement and transfer his claim.

Records without permanent residence may be issued, provided applicant makes improvements to extent of \$100 per annum and records same each year. Failure to make improvements or record same will operate as forfeiture. Title cannot be obtained in less than 5 years, and improvements of \$10.00 per acre, including 5 acres cleared and cultivated, and residence of at least 2 years are required.

Pre-emptor holding Crown grant may record another pre-emption, if he requires land in conjunction with his farm, without actual occupation, provided statutory improvements made and residence maintained on Crown granted land.

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesteads, title to be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions.

For grazing and industrial purposes areas exceeding 40 acres may be leased by one person or company.

Mill, factory or industrial sites on timber land not exceeding 40 acres may be purchased; conditions include payment of stumpage.

Natural hay meadows inaccessible to existing roads may be purchased on condition upon construction of a road to them. Rebate of one-half of cost of road, not exceeding half of purchase price, is made.

PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS

The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serving with His Majesty's Forces. The time within which the heirs or devisees of deceased pre-emptors may apply for title under this Act is extended from one year from the death of such person, as formerly until one year after the conclusion of the present war. This privilege is also made retroactive.

No fees relating to pre-emptors are due or payable by soldiers on pre-emptions recorded after June 28, 1915. Taxes are remitted for five years.

Provision for return of moneys accrued, due and been paid since August 4, 1914, on account of payments, fees or taxes on soldiers' pre-emptions.

Interest on agreements to purchase town or city lots held by members of Allied Forces, or dependents, acquired direct or indirect, remitted from enactment to March 21, 1920.

SUB-PURCHASERS OF CROWN LANDS

Provision made for issuance of Crown grants to sub-purchasers of Crown Lands, acquiring rights from purchasers who failed to complete purchase, involving forfeiture, on fulfillment of conditions of purchase, interest and taxes. Where sub-purchasers do not claim whole of original parcel, purchase price due and taxes may be distributed proportionately over whole area. Applications must be made by May 1, 1920.

GRAZING.

Grazing Act, 1919, for systematic disposal of livestock industry provides for grazing districts and large administration under Commissioner. Annual grazing permits issued based on nature and range, priority for established owners. Stock-owners may form Associations for range management. Free, or partially free, permits for settlers, campers or travellers, up to ten head.
