Mr. Tate has gone to Victoria to discuss the matter with Premier McBride.

At a secret session of the city council held a few days ago, decision was made by a majority of the aldermen to send for H.M.S.C. Rainbow in order to awe laborers who are out on strike for higher wages, it has just been revealed. The idea of bringing in the militia has also been discussed.

Without a single dissenting voice the Prince Rupert Industrial Association, at a meeting last night, passed a resolution pledging itself win or lose to conduct and continue the present strike in an orderly and law-abiding manner.

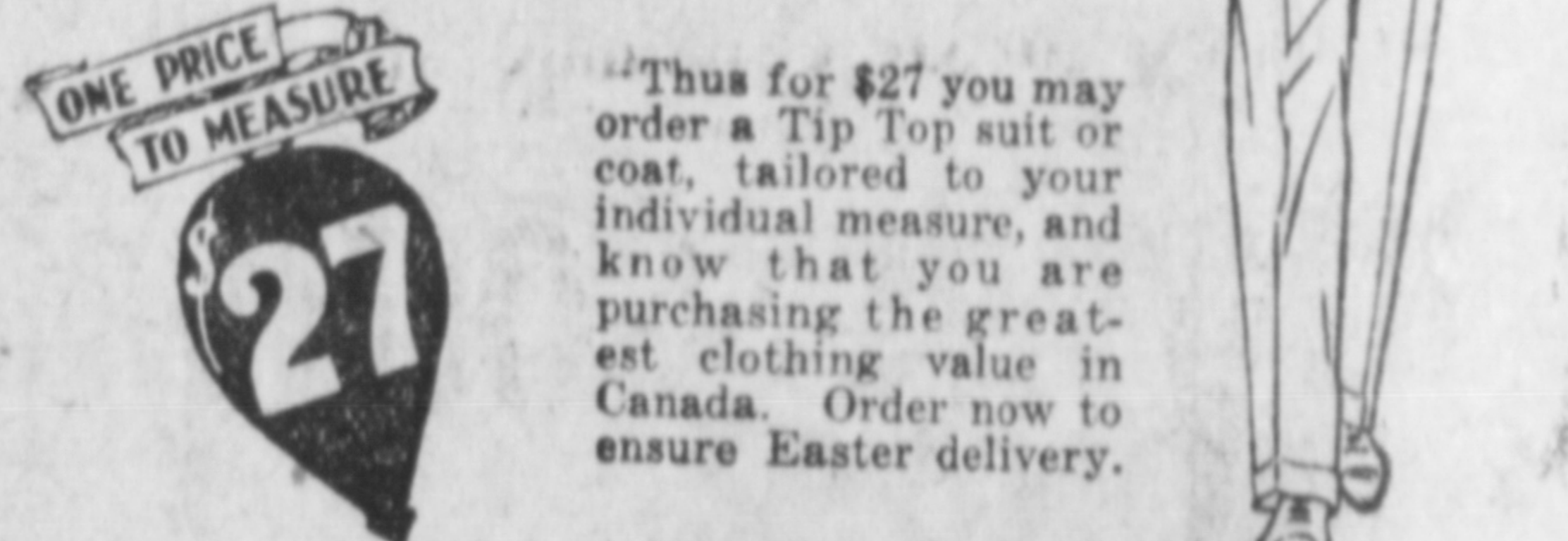
