FIGHT BILL IS PASSED

Washington Wrestling and Boxing Measure Gets Its Third Reading

OLYMPIA, Feb. 12.—Without a murmur of protest and with but one slight amendment, the bill to govern boxing and wrestling in the state of Washington was given its second reading in the state legislature yesterday and will be given its third reading today, coming up for final passage next week. It is expected the measure will go through without opposition.

The bill authorizes six-round boxing bouts in the State of Washington and will bring both boxing and wrestling under a state commission.

RECORD SET UP

Ross Robinson Establishes New Time For One-Mile Skate Sprint

NEW YORK, Feb. 12.—Ross Robinson, veteran Canadian speed skater, set up a new record here yesterday for the one-mile ice sprint. He did the distance in two minutes and 37 seconds. The former record was two minutes, 38 3-5 seconds.

SEATTLE, Feb. 12.—University of Washington and Washington State College meet here tonight and tomorrow night in the deciding games of the northwest conference basketball series. Last week-end the Huskies eliminated Oregon State College here. The games will be played in the University of Washington Athletic Pavilion.

SPORT CHAT

Famed for its annual dog derby, The Pas now boasts horse racing and followers of the sport declare it is the farthest north that equines have raced on this continent. A carload of horses arrived at the Northern Manitoba town recently and were sold to local horsemen. The horses, all trotters, will compete on a prepared track on the ice of the Saskatchewan River. The races will be a new feature of Dog Derby Week this year.

Bobsleigh teams representing the United States, Switzerland and Germany competed at Lake Placid this week in the first North American bobsleigh championship races over the Olympic bob run. The Lake Placid Club Sno Birds, in co-operation with the New York State Olympic Winter Games Commission, conducted the competition which was sanctioned by the Amateur Athletic Union and the International Bobsleigh and Tobogganing Federation. The races will serve to prepare the Americans for next year's Olympic tests.

HOT GAME EXPECTED

PORTLAND, Feb. 12.—If the rough hockey tactics that have been employed by the Seattle Eskimos in recent games are to continue, Bobby Rowe, manager of the Portland Buckaroos, threatens to get on the ice himself tonight in the game between the Eskimos and the Bucks. If these tactics are to be continued, he might as well be in on it himself, Rowe declares.

If the Eskimos win tonight they will go into a tie with the Vancouver Lions for first place. A win for the Buckaroos would make them even with the Eskimos, two points behind the Lions.

BOUT SITE IS SOUGHT

Schmeling-Stribling Bout to be Held in Chicago, Baltimore or Philadelphia

NEW YORK, Feb. 12.—The forthcoming bout between Max Schmeling and Young Stribling, in which the former will defend his world's heavyweight title, having been officially recognized, speculation is now rife as to where will be the site for the June bout. It will probably not be announced until April.

Meantime, Chicago seems to be favored as the venue with the possibility that Baltimore or Philadelphia may get the big fight if Chicago should not be suitable.

WASHINGTON SALES TAX

Drastic Revenue Bill Introduced Yesterday in State Legislature

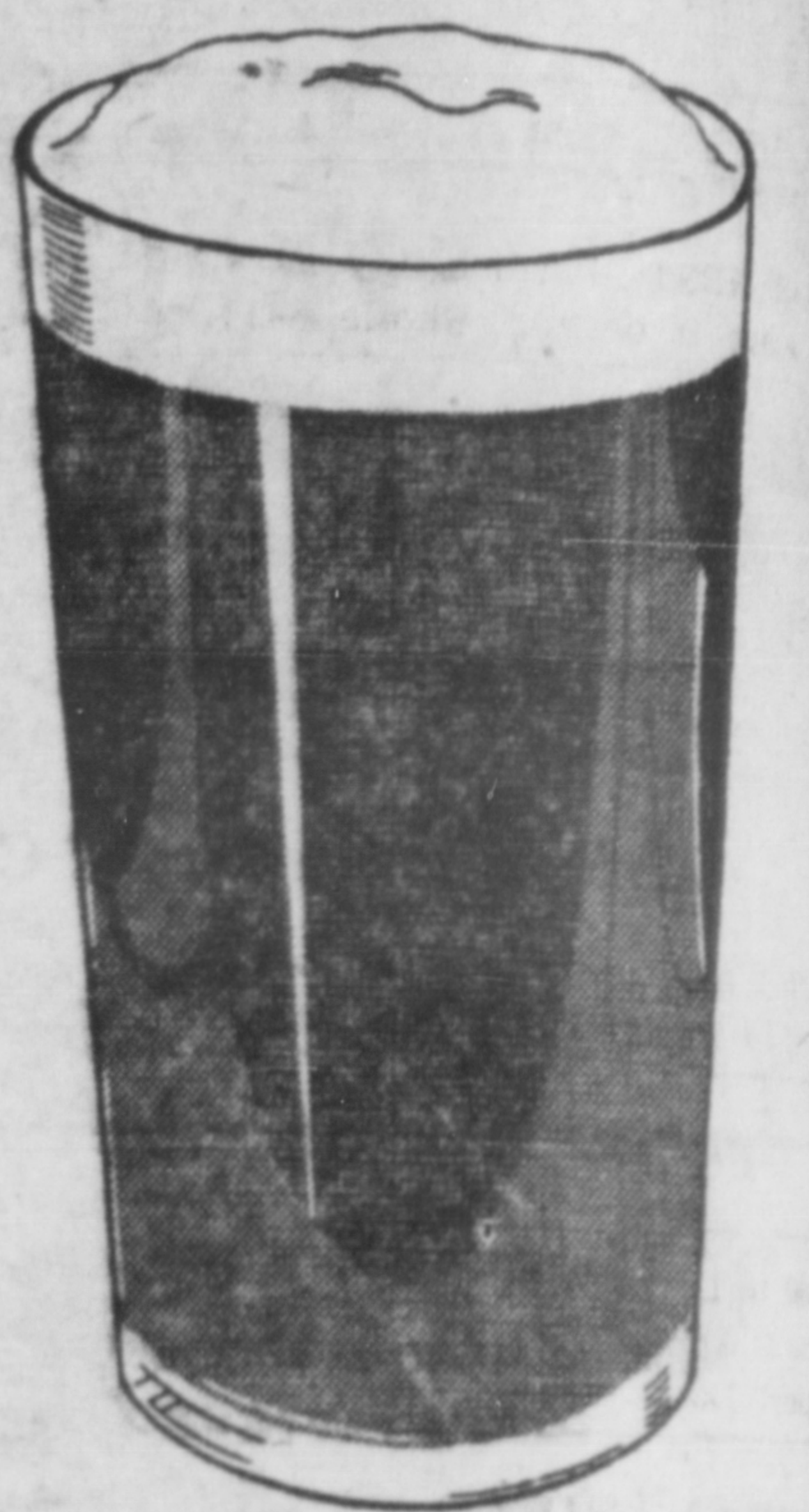
OLYMPIA, Wash., Feb. 12.—The administration yesterday introduced a state sales tax measure which it is estimated will result in some \$20,000,000 revenue annually being obtained. Provision is made to impose from one to five percent, tax on every business in the state. Public utilities services and amusement enterprises would be assessed five per cent and income from professional services, two percent, with ordinary businesses, one percent.
