**URGES NEW
TECHNICAL
BUILDING**

**John Kyle Recommends Relieving
Present Stress by Providing for
Manual Classes**

John Kyle, superintendent of technical education under the Provincial department of education, last night in a brief address to the members of the school board suggested that as space was needed for class rooms in the city, a small building should be erected to house the manual training and domestic science departments and the rooms in the Booth School now used for those purposes could then be used for class rooms. This new building would form the nucleus of a technical school.

Mr. Kyle reported very favorably on the work being done in the manual training and household science departments in the city but said that, while the household science department for girls had two instructors, the manual department for boys had only one. This meant that the work had to be confined to woodworking. If an optional course were allowed there would have to be another instructor and another room.

That the federal government would renew the grant for technical education was confidently expected. Mr. Kyle said, and Prince Rupert could take advantage of it by instituting the new department.

**Bulkley Valley Coal
To Be Included In
Next Call For Tenders**

The hospital board agreed at its meeting last night to call for tenders for Bulkley Valley coal along with other varieties when coal tenders were next called. F. M. Dockrill, manager of the Bulkley Valley Coal Co., had a letter before the board guaranteeing that his coal was of higher grade than any other on the local market, especially for steaming purposes, and asking that it be included in the next call for tenders.

It was suggested that a trial shipment of this coal might be secured meantime.

**ADDITION
TO SCHOOL
PROPOSED**

**High School Accommodation Will
Not be Sufficient After
Summer Holidays**

The school board last night discussed the question of providing accommodation for the growing demands of the High School and it was suggested that a new wing be built on the King Edward School two storeys high at a cost of approximately \$5,000. Another proposal was to erect another small room separate from the main building as a temporary expedient.

It was pointed out that the matriculation class was at present held in the office of the building, and that, after the holidays, there was every indication that another class-room would be required. This followed naturally from the extension of the course from three years to four.

The suggestion was made that the commercial class might be dropped but this did not seem to meet with favor.

It was urged by one trustee that if a permanent extension of the building were being erected provision should be made for a much-needed assembly room.

After a desultory discussion it was decided to hold another meeting at the school building Saturday afternoon to come to a definite decision. The estimates had to be in by Monday according to law and they could not be delayed.

The board completed the estimates in most of the school departments but left over the question of extraordinary expenditures.
