GRANITE QUARRY FOR CITY USE

Proposal to Purchase One Near Mouth of Skeena.

The City Council last night spent some time discussing the matter of purchasing a granite quarry in order to secure suitable rock for the use of the city. The quarry on Smith Island seemed to be most in favor, but the matter is left open for further investigation.

A quarry near Caspaco owned by Fred Ritchie and another up the Ecstall owned by Capt. Babington are among the possibilities. At the latter there is waterpower adjoining.

It was reported that the railway rate from Caspaco was \$1 a ton, and from Cedarvale \$2.20 a ton. The estimated cost of carrying on barges from Smith Island was put at 40c a ton.

Alderman Casey said that it would take several months to develop a quarry so that an unlimited amount of rock could be secured cheaply. The method would be to tunnel into the rock and quarry into a glory hole.

THE PROHIBITION ACT

As the Prohibition Act stands the medical profession have it within their power to make it effective or to bring discredit upon it, and let me say in defence of the profession that such discredit is the result of the actions of but a very small minority.

As the opening of the House is not very far distant, at which session the act will come under discussion it is a propos that the deficiencies of the act and proposed amendments be brought before the public for consideration and discussion.

The following amendments I, unofficially, submit for discussion: 1. That a legal distinction be made between the terms "order" and "prescription," and that the word "prescription" be used in its ordinary medical acceptance.

2. That the issuing of orders for liquor be taken out of the hands of the medical profession.

Domestic Use.

3. That liquor for domestic use "be available" under the following conditions, viz.—The presentation to the vendor of an order obtained from, and signed by the prohibition commissioner, and countersigned by either a justice of the peace or by a clergyman certifying that the purchaser is of a good moral character and does not become intoxicated. The maximum amount that can be purchased per month by such person to be fixed by statute.

4. That the prescribing of liquor by physicians be limited to bona fide prescriptions, stating definitely the amount and conditions under which such liquor is to be taken, such prescriptions to be filled by any licensed druggist, and not to be refilled without the consent of the physician.

5. Since there are still many physicians of excellent standing who conscientiously administer alcoholics, the privilege of the alcoholic prescription should be granted, and upon the other hand it is not just that the great mass of the profession who are honestly endeavoring to comply with the spirit of the Act be deprived of the privilege of using any drug because a few abuse that privilege.

Offenders.

There should be some method of dealing with the offender, and it does seem fitting that this is a matter that should come within the disciplinary powers of the B. C. Medical Council, that is, to make the medical profession self-disciplinary. No part of the community is more anxious that a high standard both of skill and conduct be maintained by the medical profession than is the vast majority of its own members. This would necessitate a slight amendment of the B. C. Medical Act in the enlargement of its disciplinary jurisdiction.

6. That any member of the medical profession whose actions give good reasons to suspect that he is wilfully violating the spirit and intention of the act, may be summoned to appear before the prohibition commission who shall in association with a medical man nominated by the president of the B. C. Medical Council or a County Court Judge, give the accused op-

portunity to justify his actions, and if in the opinion of the commissioner he has violated his trust the case be referred to the executive of the Medical Council, who should have the power to suspend or revoke his license to practice within the province if they consider his conduct unworthy of a member of the medical profession. STREET PAVING IS BEFORE COMMITTEE

Report of Board of Trade Read Last Night at Council Meeting.

At the City Council meeting last night the report of the Board of Trade regarding the paving of the streets in the business section was read and referred to the Board of Works for report.

There was a suggestion from Alderman McRae that it might be filed without being read, the inference being that they had all read it in the newspapers. It was suggested, however, that the newspaper account did not give the report in full and on the request of Alderman Casey it was read.

The whole matter of paving and grading will come up soon, and at last night's meeting Acting Mayor Rochester appointed a committee consisting of Alderman Casey, Perry, and Kirkpatrick to report on the powers under the Municipal Act.
