## Investigation Into Halibut Livers Proceeds

Charles F. Lanwermeyer Tells Juneau People of Work He Is Doing View to Industry

Halibut liver oil! Will babies cry for it? Maybe, some day. Experiments now in progress may prove it to be much richer in medicinal properties than cod liver oil, says the Juneau Empire.

Charles F. Lanwermeyer of the Abbott Laboratories of North Chicago, Ill., has been in the north two months conducting research studies into the chemical content of halibut liver and arranging for supplies of the fish product to be used in further investigation. He came to Juneau this week from Ketchikan. Previously he had been at Prince Rupert, B.C.

### Long Lived Fish

"In a long-lived fish like the halibut, according to the theory of scientists, there is stored up food content," explained Mr. Lanwermeyer.

"The belief obtains that the place for this storage is the liver. A halibut adds a pound to its weight every year of its life. A male halibut will attain a maximum of 75 pounds, a female, as much as 400. Supposedly a female may live as long as four hundred years.

"The liver of a 75-pound halibut weighs about one pound as a rule.

"About 15% of the halibut liver is oil, while 50% of the cod liver is oil.

### Fifteen Times Richer

"A conservative estimate places halibut liver oil as about 15 times richer than cod liver oil in their known medicinal properties.

"These properties are called vitamins. Scientists do not know what vitamins are but they do know what they will do. They are classified by what they will do.

"To date, in the experiments conducted by the Abbott Laboratories, halibut liver oil has been administered to animals only. The results have been such as to encourage the present investigation and research.

### Pharmaceutical Products

"The Abbott Laboratories manufacture pharmaceutical products, and maintain a large research department.

"If halibut liver oil should prove to be efficacious and its extraction made practicable, a production plant would probably be established in Alaska. Handling the material in this territory would be more feasible than shipping it to Illinois."

The laboratories are paying nine cents a pound for the livers. This part of the fish is now being thrown away.

After concluding his investigations in Juneau, Mr. Lanwermeyer will return to North Chicago.

## Twenty Years Ago

In Prince Rupert

July 30, 1911

Britain prepares for war with Germany over occupation of Agadir in Morocco.

"Still striding into line with the up-to-date cities of the world, Prince Rupert today witnessed an auto car carrying a party of sight seeing tourists around the city. Members of the party were Mr. and Mrs. C. L. Behnson, Mr. and Mrs. C. A. Rolde of Vancouver and their friends in Prince Rupert, Mr. and Mrs. F. W. Hart. From the wharf the car sped off to McBride Street, thence along Fifth Avenue to the high level bridge over Hays Creek. After a swift race to the crest of the rise there, the party motored back by Sixth Avenue and round to Fourth at the Bacon residence from which such a fine view of the city and harbor is gained. From there it was a quick race to the Royal where the party breakfasted and then caught the Venture to continue their tour. This little incident so early in the history of Prince Rupert points to a very big tourist business before long."

The government plan, which if carried out, will leave the men, with practically nothing after they buy boots, clothing, etc., as there are lots of days in the winter time when it is impossible to work, owing to the stormy weather.

Also I know camps can be run on much less than \$1 per day for board. When I was out for two weeks on the same work, board was 80c, so some one must be wanting a rake-off.

Why not take a copy of the New Zealand scheme, where everyone is paid decent wages, and only 15 cents deducted for board. The majority of the workers want to pay their accounts, which the hotels, cafes, etc., have been good enough to credit them for, but under this plan impossible.
