workers. Kioto, where the greatest statue of Buddha is located, was for many years the capital of the country, and the emperors are still crowned there. This he found was the best place for tourists to buy for they could find anything they wanted there. The sacred deer were interesting. They were very tame and were fed by tourists.

Kobe was the chief port for trade with Canada. It was a city of less than one hundred thousand people but was the port for Osaka a city of two and three-quarter millions.
