Temperature is cited as perhaps the most important factor in preservation of fresh fish, the most rapid bacterial growth being at temperature of between 68 and 77 degrees. Even though fish are preserved by ice there is still a slow but sure growth of bacteria continually attacking the fish and. if the temperature is allowed to rise, the bacteria rapidly increase. Experiments are now being made to determine whether bacteria die at a temperature of below 23 degrees. The result of this xperiment will have direct bearing on the question of best temperature for refrigeration and the time that fresh fish may be satisfactorily held.
