HOOVER IS CANDIDATE

Will No Doubt Receive Republican Nomination Again

WASHINGTON, Jan. 19.—Despite certain defections of late in his party, the renomination of President Herbert Hoover as Republican presidential candidate in 1932 is deemed a certainty. The fact is that the party has no other suitable man available. Moreover, the party could hardly repudiate its own president and his policies.

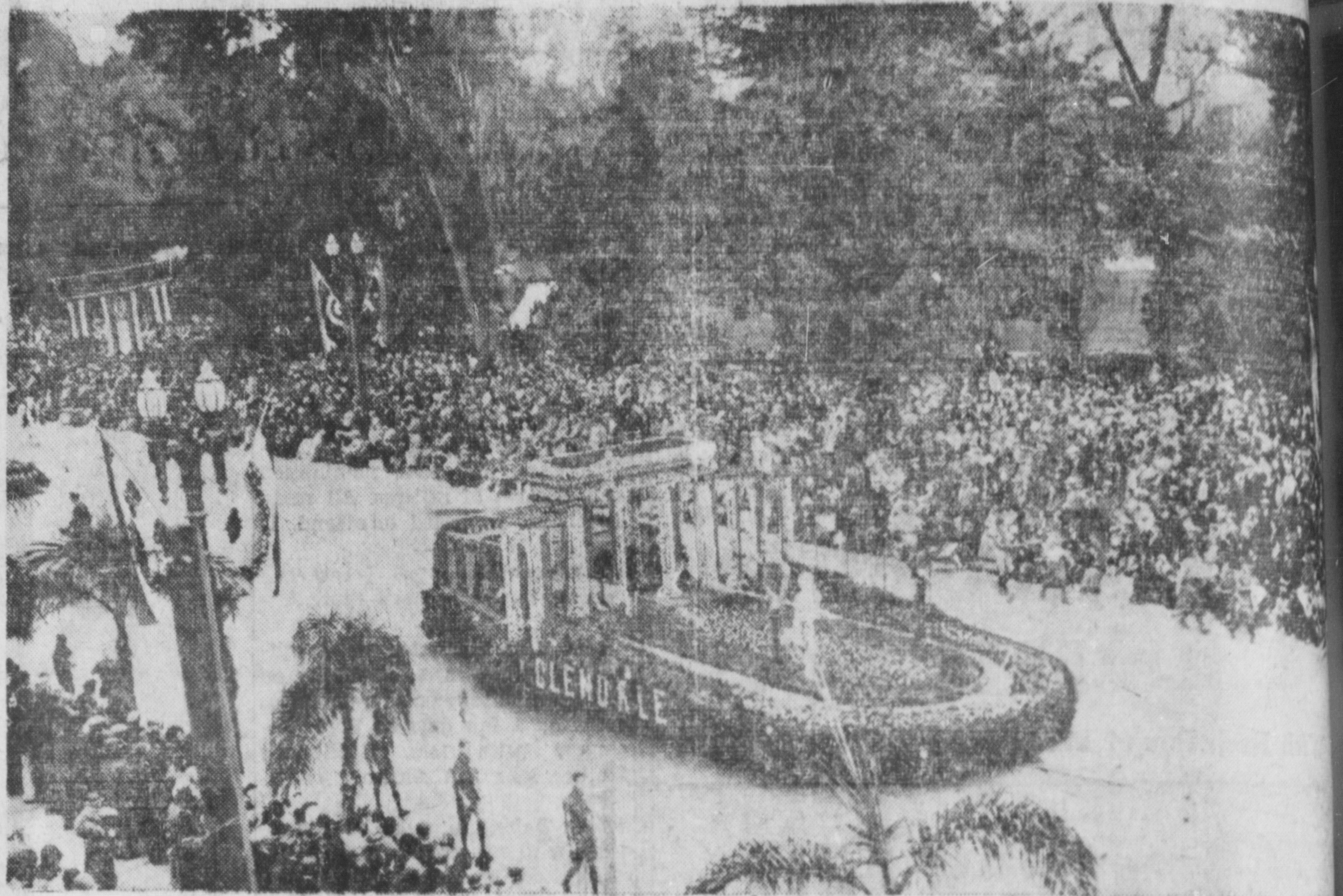
It will be 18 months before the election yet, in all the acts of the administration, can be perceived the move to renominate President Hoover. Whether he is re-elected, may depend to a large extent upon whether or not there is recovery from the present depression.

Conversely to the endeavors of the Republicans, the efforts of the Democrats are to discredit and weaken President Hoover as much as possible. If they can succeed in doing this, they know they can win.

Meantime, there is no effective party control in Congress owing to the narrow and treacherous majorities of the parties. It is government by compromise and the present Congress is proving one of the most futile in the history of the United States.

BADLY OFF IN STATES

Hunger and Hardship in Southern States—Relief Machinery Now Being Set in Motion

WASHINGTON, Jan. 19.—New stories of hunger and hardship in the drought-stricken south are being written in Red Cross records here as plans are made to administer the \$10,000,000 fund which has been voted by Congress for relief of the sufferers.

From one county in Texas come reports of three hundred destitute families and from another is received word of two hundred families in similar circumstances. The

children are ragged, without food and on the verge of starvation. If relief is not available before another blizzard comes, many will starve or freeze to death. One family of five was found barefoot tramping through the snow, too proud to ask for help.

Conditions similar to these are reported in such other states as Tennessee, Oklahoma and Arkansas.

Meanwhile, President Hoover is losing no time in getting relief machinery in motion. Hundreds of leading people in the United States have been called upon by the president for assistance in administering the \$10,000,000 fund. At the head of the committee which is thus being formed, Mr. Hoover has placed Former President Calvin Coolidge. Ex-Governor A. E. Smith of New York and John W. Davis, Democratic presidential candidate in 1924, have been invited to take a prominent

part in the work of the committee.
