Life Subject For Science Churches

Lesson Sermon of All Churches and Societies Yesterday

The subject of the lesson-sermon in all Christian Science churches and societies on Sunday was "Life." Among the Bible texts included in the lesson-sermon was the following from I Peter 3:10: "For he that will love life, and see good days, let him refrain his tongue from evil, and his lips that they speak no guile."

The lesson-sermon also included the reading of citations from the Christian Science textbook: "Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures," by Mary Baker Eddy, one passage being as follows: "We apprehend Life in divine Science only as we live above corporeal sense and correct it.
