GOLD IN STATES

WASHINGTON, April 16:—A
survey which has just been com-
pleted reveals that United States
is still holding 45% of the world's
supply of gold, there being some
\$4,706,000,000 of the precious met-
al in store in this country. Dur-
ing the last year there has been
an increase of \$277,000,000.

The total world's gold supply is
placed at \$10,000,000,000.

NO CAMPS THIS YEAR

OTTAWA, April 16:—All summer
training camps for units of the non-
permanent militia of Canada have
been cancelled for this year in view
of a cut in estimates.

CALIFORNIA BOAT LOST

SANTA BARBARA, April 16:—
Grave concern is being felt for the
safety of crew and four passengers
of the schooner Amazon, which left
here a week ago for San Miguel Is-
land and has no been since seen or
heard from.

Other boats are being dispatched
to search for the missing vessel.

February Fish Landings Were Virtually Nil

According to figures made avail-
able at the office of the United
States consul, 42,939 pounds of fish
was landed during the month of
February at Alaska ports, 2,900
pounds at Vancouver, 1,000 pounds
at Victoria and 19,650 pounds at
Seattle. Owing to the delay in start-
ing halibut fishing operations, there
was no fish landed at Prince Rupert
in February.

At the Rotary Club luncheon to-
