DR. LAD MALADY IN MILITARY CAMP

BISHOP STRINGER OF YUKON ELEVATED TO ARCHBISHOP

Spotted Fever Breaks Out At Catterick and British Soldiers Ill

Two Have Already Died With Ailment and More Are in Serious Condition—Strict Quarantine is Being Observed

CATTERICK, Yorkshire, England, April 16:—Eight thousand soldiers at a British Army camp here have been isolated as a consequence of an outbreak of the dread spotted fever. Two soldiers have died and many others are in a serious condition. The origin of the malady has not yet been determined, but drastic steps are being taken to prevent its spread. A strict quarantine will be observed, no one being allowed either to visit or leave the camp.

BANK IS HELD UP

Sum of \$4,700 is Taken From Institution at Concrete, Wash., By Bandits

CONCRETE, Wash., April 16:—Two well dressed bandits entered the Concrete National Bank yesterday and held the place up, escaping with \$4,700 in cash and kidnapping the president, a woman employee and one customer who happened to be in the premises. These people were driven at breakneck speed for a distance along the highway and were then thrown out of the car. The bandits then headed in the direction of Sedro-Woolley. A county-wide search has now been instituted for the bandits.

PANTAGES COMMITTED

Millionaire Showman Must Face Trial on Statutory Charge

SAN DIEGO, April 16:—The courts ruled yesterday that Alexander Pantages, millionaire showman, will have to stand trial with three others for allegedly being active in a "Love Bazaar" here. Pantages' application for a reduction in bail was denied.

PROSPECTOR FOUND DEAD

Body of Dawson Miner Found Lashed to Tree With Bullet Through Head

DAWSON, April 16:—Tied in an upright position to a tree on a hillside overlooking the Klondike River near here, the body of John Martin, miner, was found. He is believed to have shot himself through the head.

CHINESE DROWNED

Thirty-Five Lives Lost in Boat Collision Off Mouth of Yangtze

SHANGHAI, China, April 16:—Thirty-five Chinese were drowned yesterday when two Chinese coasting steamers collided off the mouth of the Yangtze River. One of the boats sank but the other escaped with little damage.

Ten Thousand Dollar Loss in Blaze in Seattle Yesterday

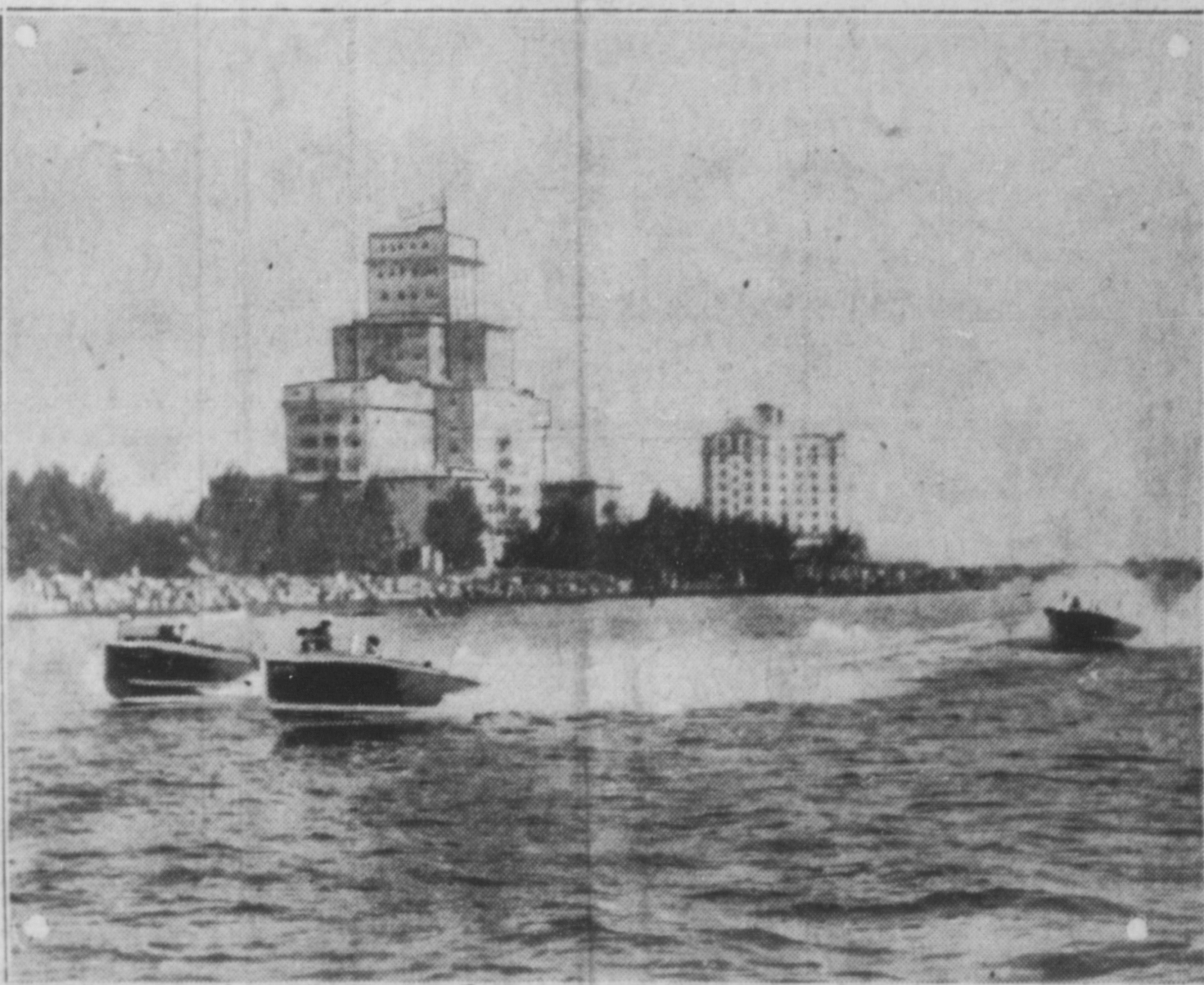

SIX-HOUR DAY PLAN

Kellogg Company Adopts It as Permanent Institution in Its Plant

NEW YORK, April 16:—The six-hour working day plan has worked out so well both for the company and employees that the Kellogg Co. has decided to permanently adopt the system for its great plant at Battle Creek, Mich., it was announced here yesterday.

Under the six-hour day plan, the company uses four shifts per day instead of three as before. There is also an advance in the wage scale.

BROKER IS ARRESTED

William Martin Jr. or Winnipeg is Charged With Theft of Enormous Sum

WINNIPEG, April 16:—Charged with theft of \$239,000, William Martin Jr., head of the bankrupt brokerage firm of Clark-Martin, was arrested late yesterday. He was later released on bail of \$100,000.

DRY LAWS DENOUNCED

Vice-President of American Federation of Labor Calls Them "Experiment in Hypocrisy"

WASHINGTON, April 16:—In a scathing denunciation of United States prohibition laws before a gathering of women here yesterday, Matthew Wall, vice-president of the American Federation of Labor, described the Eighteenth Amendment as "the greatest experiment in hypocrisy in the history of the country."

PUT DOWN REBELLION

United States Marines Active in Nicaragua Where Foreigners Have Been Killed

COLON, April 16:—United States Marines yesterday inflicted heavy losses upon Nicaraguan rebels, whose activities they are attempting to put down. Airplanes were assisting the marines.

It was stated yesterday that eight Americans—practically all employees of the Standard Fruit & Steamship Co.—as well as an unknown number of British and natives, lost their lives in recent disorders in Nicaragua.

RENDEZVOUS UNDER POLE

Submarine and Dirigible May Meet This Summer in Far North

BERLIN, April 16:—Dr. Hugo Eckener intimated the possibility of the Graf Zeppelin making rendezvous this summer in the North Polar regions with the submarine Nautilus in which Sir Hubert plans an under-water cruise to the North Pole.

Dr. Eckener is making plans for the Graf Zeppelin to travel over the North Pole to the United States.

DEMPSEY STARTS DIVORCE ACTION

RENO, April 16:—Conflicting reports and statements in regard to Jack Dempsey's intention to divorce his moving picture star wife, Estelle Taylor, were settled yesterday when the former world's heavyweight champion definitely started divorce proceedings by retaining Robert Burns as lawyer to conduct his petition.

PALACE IS DESTROYED

BERLIN, April 16:—Blücher Palace, famous old landmark of Berlin, was razed by fire yesterday, the loss being estimated at \$7,500,000. The United States had just about completed arrangements to take over the famous edifice for embassy use.

Veteran Missionary Of North to Preside Over All Northwest

Prince Rupert Friends and Admirers Will Rejoice at Esteemed Cleric's Advancement—Well Known in This Diocese Also

WINNIPEG, April 16:—Rev. Isaac O. Stringer, veteran missionary of the north and Bishop of the Yukon since 1905, was yesterday elected Archbishop of the Anglican Diocese of Rupert's Land, which takes in Manitoba and the country north to Hudson Bay. Bishop Stringer, one of Canada's best known and most highly esteemed churchmen, succeeds Archbishop Matheson, former Primate of Canada, who has resigned, owing to ill-health. He will move from Dawson to Winnipeg and a new bishop will have to be named for the Yukon.

The indomitable Bishop Stringer has already spent almost all his active life in the north country. A man of tremendous spirit and powerful physique, he has often endured hardships he would not permit his subordinates to share. He has already felt a great respect for the simple people among whom he has labored and his striking and genial personality has ever impressed itself upon all those with whom he comes in contact.

Sixty-five years of age on Friday of last week, Bishop Stringer is a native of Bruce County, Ont., having been born in Kincardine. After obtaining his B.A. degree at Toronto University, he graduated from Wycliffe College in 1892 and immediately went as a missionary to the Eskimos at Herschel Island in the Arctic Circle. In the north he has labored ever since.

In 1893 he was appointed rector at Whitehorse where he remained until his consecration as bishop in 1905 for the Yukon Diocese including the whole of the Northwest Territories west of the Rockies. At the same time the honorary degree of Doctor of Divinity was conferred upon him by St. John's College, Winnipeg.

Pleased indeed will Bishop Stringer's friends be to learn of his elevation to be an Archbishop. He has many devoted friends here, not only among Anglican Church people but among citizens generally. He was here only a few days ago conducting Easter confirmations owing to the indisposition of Rt. Rev. G. A. Rix, Bishop of Caledonia. He proceeded from here to the central interior and the Peace River district and then to Winnipeg. He is expected back here in May en route to the Yukon.

Bishop Rix Delighted
Bishop George A. Rix of Caledonia expressed keen delight today when informed of Bishop Stringer's election as Archbishop of Rupert's Land. Bishop Stringer and Bishop Rix have been close friends for many years, having attended Wycliffe College together. "One of the finest and ablest clerics in Canada," was the tribute Bishop Rix paid to his friend.

LABORITE WON SEAT

No Change in Standing of British House as Result of By-Election Yesterday

WOOLWICH, April 16:—Labor retained East Woolwich in a by-election yesterday. George Hooks, the Laborite candidate, was elected over a Conservative.

SIAM KING INDISPOSED

His Majesty May Be Unable to Accept Hospitality at Victoria Today

VANCOUVER, April 16:—Wireless messages yesterday from the steamship Empress of Japan stated that the King of Siam was indisposed and under doctor's care aboard the vessel. It is possible that His Majesty may not leave the steamer when it arrives at Victoria today but instead remain on board and come on to Vancouver.

An ambitious reception had been planned in Victoria for the Regal party. Many dignitaries are here to meet the king.

BABIES BUT NOT BIRDS

Regulations Set For Aerial Transportation in States

DETROIT, April 16:—At an aerial transportation conference, which has been in session here for several days, it was decided that dogs, cats, canaries, goldfish and other such creatures would be barred from travelling in commercial airplanes in this country.

It was agreed, however, that children in arms under two years of age should be given free passage.

TWO HUNDRED NATIVES DIE

Military Police and Rebels Clash Near Rangoon

RANGOON, Burma, April 16:—Two hundred natives have been killed in clashes between military police and native rebels, it was announced yesterday.

SOVIET IS BUYING HEAVY MACHINERY GERMANY SELLING IT

BERLIN, April 16:—Negotiations have been completed between Russia and Germany whereby the Soviet will purchase from this country \$75,000,000 worth of heavy industrial machinery and equipment. Details of financing have not yet been announced although it is understood Russia will pay twenty percent in drafts on delivery of goods.
