NEW YORK, Aug. 6:-New York Yankees and Boston Red Sox divided honors yesterday in a doubleheader before 25,000 fans. Boston won the first game but homers by Babe Ruth and Lou Gehrig assisted the Yankees in taking the second. It was Ruth's twenty-ninth circuit clout of the season and Gehrig's thirty-first.


