# LINDBERGH'S FORCED DOWN IN NORTH

## NO CHANGE IN OTTAWA HOUSE AS RESULT BY-ELECTIONS

### Famous Flying Pair Descend on Account Of Fog Nearby Nome

Are Safe on North Coast of Seward Peninsula and Awaiting Clearing of Weather Before Resuming Flight to Tokyo

NOME, Alaska, Aug. 11.—Col. Charles A. Lindbergh, who is accompanied by his wife on a projected flight from New York to Tokyo, landed on the north coast of Seward Peninsula at 11 o'clock last night on account of fog after having left Point Barrow at 5:53 yesterday afternoon. They landed about seventy-five miles from Nome. Mrs. Lindbergh sent out word by radio that she and her husband were awaiting the weather to clear before resuming the flight in their big Lockheed-Sirius low winged monoplane.

### QUIET DAY ON MARKET

Drop in Rails Was Only Feature of Yesterday's Business in New York

NEW YORK, Aug. 11.—The stock market, except for lower prices on rails, was not greatly changed on yesterday's trading which was as dull as any in recent weeks.

### Water Diviner In Peace Valley

VICTORIA, Aug. 11.—The work of Miss Penrose, employed by the provincial government as a water diviner, is giving good satisfaction in the Peace River Block where she is now operating. She has located sources of water supply at Fort St. John, Dawson Creek and Pouce Coupe.

### Tornado Sweeps Coast of France

Fifty Vessels Were Wrecked Yesterday and Loss of Life Heavy

TOULON, France, Aug. 11.—Fifty vessels were wrecked with heavy loss of life in a tornado which swept the seas near here while heavy property damage was done inland.

### Refinancing Plan For Government Ships Drawn Up

WASHINGTON, D.C., Aug. 11.—A plan for the refinancing of the United States Ship Lines on liberal terms has been formulated by United States Shipping Board officials.

### ACCORD BETWEEN CHURCHES NEAR

LONDON, Aug. 11.—Complete communion, according to the Daily Telegraph, will be established between the Church of England and the old Catholic churches of the continent before the end of the year.

### MUST MAKE NEW START

Beauharnois Will Have to Make Fresh Application For Rights

OTTAWA, Aug. 11.—The Beauharnois Power Co., it is indicated, will have to start all over in its process of getting the government's consent for various rights. The company, it is further stated, will be expected for the purposes of navigation to hand over its lands and appurtenances to the Dominion government.

### Peace River Pre-emptions

Rush of Land Seekers Continues as Summer Advances

VICTORIA, Aug. 11.—With the advance of summer the rush for free land in the Peace River district of B.C. still continues. For June 159 records were issued and for July 178. This means that since the government took over the Peace River Block last fall, 121,200 acres have been pre-empted for residence and improvement. Latest crop reports from the district show that high temperatures and winds are likely to reduce the wheat yield by five bushels an acre.

### WILL SHOW RED WHEAT

Peace River and Central B.C. to Be Represented at Big Regina Show Next Year

VICTORIA, Aug. 11.—Hard red spring wheat and peas from the Peace River Block will be exhibited at the World's Grain Exhibition in Regina next year. Grass seed will be sent from Central British Columbia.

The provincial department of agriculture will co-operate with prospective exhibitors at the big show.

### Prince George Tax Collections Higher In 1931 Than 1930

PRINCE GEORGE, Aug. 11.—Despite the depression, collection of municipal taxes in Prince George this year shows a slight increase over last year. Total collections up to June 30, when the first penalty went on, were \$33,983 as against \$33,604 at the same date in 1930.

### MORE TRADE IN ORIENT

Hon. Herbert M. Marler States in Toronto That Prospects Are Bright

TORONTO, Aug. 11.—Hon. Herbert M. Marler, Canadian minister plenipotentiary to Japan, in an address here yesterday, stated that there were bright prospects for increased trade with the Orient.

### CRAMER MISSING

No Word of Trans-Atlantic Flyer Since He Left Bergen For Copenhagen

OSLO, Aug. 11.—Inquiries along the south coast of Norway have failed to elicit any trace of Parker D. Cramer, United States flyer, and Oliver Paquette, his mechanic and radio operator.

Cramer and Paquette took off from Shetland Islands Sunday for Copenhagen after having successfully spanned the Atlantic Ocean on an air-mail route mapping flight.

As time passes fears are beginning to grow that Cramer and Paquette, a Canadian, must have perished. Their plane was equipped with radio.

### Prince George Police Officer Rescues Woman

Provincial Constable D. J. Bingham of Prince George, who is spending a holiday in Vancouver, saved the life of Mrs. G. Groskley last week by jumping into Vancouver harbor and rescuing her from drowning after she had fallen into the water from the North Vancouver ferry dock.

Provincial Constable Bingham is the son of Chief of Police W. J. Bingham of Vancouver.

### ENGLAND GETTING GRAIN OF SOVIET

ISTANBUL, Turkey, Aug. 11.—During the first six days of August, 95,000 tons of Soviet Russia grain from Black Sea ports passed through the Bosporus en route to England.

### COTTON IS IN PANIC

Liverpool Has Sharp Drop While New York Prices Go to Lowest Level Since 1900

LIVERPOOL, Aug. 11.—A sharp fall of nearly two cents per pound in the price of cotton below Saturday's closing price took place yesterday on the Liverpool Cotton Exchange.

NEW YORK, Aug. 11.—Cotton prices in a demoralized market broke violently with both October and December contracts selling below the seven-cent level, the lowest price recorded since 1900.

### WILKINS TO SPITZBERGEN

Arctic Explorer Leaves Tromsø for Island in Far North After One-Day Halt

TROMSØ, Norway, August 11.—Sir Hubert Wilkins with his polar submarine Nautilus departed from this port yesterday after a one-day halt on its way to Spitzbergen.

Sir Hubert has given up his plan of travelling under the ice to the North Pole but will do some exploration work around Spitzbergen.

The Nautilus was today reported adrift in the Arctic seas with engine trouble.

### RATE ON LEATHER

Canadian Railways Ask U. S. Commerce Commission For Re-consideration

WASHINGTON, Aug. 11.—The Canadian railways have asked the Interstate Commerce Commission to re-open consideration of joint rates on scrap leather shipped from Canada into the United States.

### Conservatives Take Traditional Liberal Seat in Quebec But Lose Ontario Contest to Laborites

OTTAWA, Aug. 11.—The Conservative government emerged out of the East Hamilton and Three Rivers-St. Maurice by-elections yesterday still holding a majority in the House of Commons of twenty-four over the combined opposition. The Conservatives gained the stronghold of Three Rivers-St. Maurice after it had remained thirty-one years in the Liberal column but lost East Hamilton which they had held since 1904.

### PRAISES MEMBERS

Capt. Ian Mackenzie Tells of Good Work B. C. Representatives Did at Ottawa

VANCOUVER, Aug. 11.—Hon. Ian Mackenzie, ranking Liberal member from British Columbia and conqueror of Hon. H. H. Stevens in Vancouver Centre at the last Dominion election, has arrived home from his sessional labors at Ottawa.

Wilfrid Hanbury, M.P. for Burrard who accompanied him most of the way, left the train at Kamloops to visit his mill. A. E. Munn, member for Vancouver North, and Angus MacInnis, Vancouver South, are expected soon.

"It was a strenuous session—five long months of it," said Capt. Mackenzie, who declined to discuss the issues at this time. "I've said enough about them already." But he was enthusiastic in his praise of the British Columbia group of oppositionists.

"Collectively and individually, they made themselves a real force in Parliament," he said. "All of them took prominent parts in the big issues of the session and worked indefatigably for this province."

Olof Hanson was listened to with respect on the fisheries question; Wilfrid Hanbury took a leading part in discussion of the Australian treaty and was on the National Railways committee; Thomas Reid on agriculture and other matters made his presence felt, while Mr. Munn's skill in piloting the Second Narrows Bridge Bill through the House was generally commended, said Capt. Mackenzie.

A holiday is the Vancouver Centre member's immediate objective.
