Provincial Government To Establish Official In London; Aid Trade

Announcement Made By Hon. N. S. Lougheed to Manufacturers in Vancouver-Administration Willing to Spend \$15,000

VANCOUVER, April 9:—The provincial government is prepared this year to contribute \$15,000 toward the establishment of a permanent official in London to further the nterests of the British Columbia lumber industry in the United Kingdom, Hon. Nelson S. Lougheed announced before the British Columbia Division of the Canadian Manufacturers' Association at its annual *meeting last night.


