**RUPERT ON DRY DOCK STOP WORK ON HIGHWAY**

Survey Today Expected To Reveal Cause of Recent Mysterious Sinking Money Will be Available Next Month for Continuance Soon as Weather Fit

VICTORIA, March 16.—The C.N.R. steamer Prince Rupert, which sank while tied up at Yarrow's shipyard wharf a week ago Friday night and was raised on Saturday, was floated into the government dry dock at Esquimalt yesterday and will be surveyed today. Pending the survey exact cause of the mysterious sinking may not be known.

The Board of Trade has received a reply from Hon. R. W. Bruhn, Minister of Public Works, in regard to the continuation of the work on the highway. He says that the funds for the year are now practically exhausted and cannot be augmented at the moment.

"The district vote and other monies passed by the House during the present session will be available on the first proximo, however, and work will be undertaken just as soon as weather conditions will allow of this being economically done."

Roadwork closed on Saturday.

**WORKLESS SUICIDED**

Victoria Entertainer Takes His Own Life by Cutting Throat With Razor Blade

VICTORIA, March 16.—The body of William Marshall, popular local entertainer, missing for two weeks, was found in a stump hole in the bush near Ten Mile Point on Sunday, the throat cut with a razor blade. On the body was found a note to Mrs. Marshall.

TORONTO, March 16.—William Milpe, the alleged murderer of his wife, asserts that his wife had been incessantly drinking of late. He is believed to have worked himself into a state of virtual insanity. He came home after working eighty hours, found his wife drunk and admitted kicking her to death.

**RED CROSS SUCCESSFUL**

Nearly \$10,000,000 Raised for United States Drought Relief

NEW YORK, March 16.—Up to the week-end the American Red Cross Society has raised in its National campaign for funds to provide relief for southwest drought sufferers \$9,904,000 of a \$10,000,000 objective, it was announced. The next few days are expected to see the objective attained.

The society is directly caring for at the present time over 349,000 families. Never since the war has the Society been so active.

OTTAWA, March 16.—Prime Minister R. B. Bennett had a telephone chat at the week-end over long distance wires with Sir Geo. Perley, minister without portfolio and the Conservative chieftain's first lieutenant, the latter being at Montevideo, Uruguay, with the Canadian Trade Commission to the British Empire Trade Exposition in Buenos Aires.

**GOING TO NANAIMO**

C. L. Monroe Advised Officially of His Transfer South as Government Agent

C. L. Monroe has been officially advised of his appointment to the position of Government Agent at Nanaimo. He will be going south about the first of next month, with Mrs. Monroe following later.

Mr. Monroe's transfer to Nanaimo comes in view of the reinstatement of Norman A. Watt as government agent here. Mr. Watt resumes his local duties on April 1st.

**SEAL SHIP BLOWS UP**

One Hundred and Fifty of Newfoundland Crew Reported Marooned on Ice Pack

ST. JOHN'S, Newfoundland, Mar. 16.—Unconfirmed reports today, said that the sealing ship Viking,

commanded by Capt. Abraham Kean jr., with Varick Frissel, film director, and crew of 150 on board, had blown up at sea. Three vessels are now investigating.

Marooned on a loose ice pack on the North Atlantic, surviving members of the crew of an unidentified vessel, which was burned to the water's edge and which is believed to have been the Viking, were drifting seaward, according to reports made to the government late this afternoon from White Bay.
