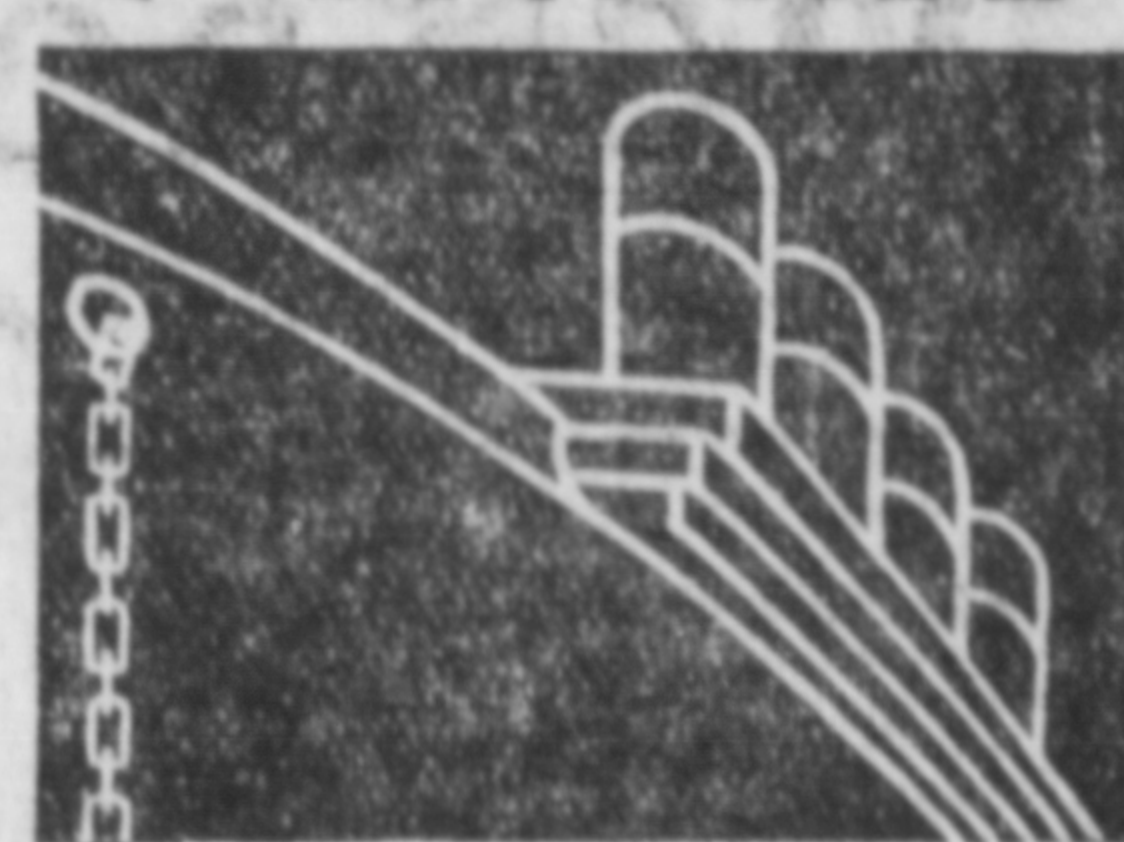

TOLMIE GOVERNMENT STILL STAGGERING UNDER STINGING INDICTMENT

crop failure, no tie contracts and the settlers in a struggling condition, had received only \$10,000.

"There are only 500 people up there," declared Hon. R. W. Bruhn. "I would like every up-country elector to see the Loughheed highway across Dewdney," said Mr. Manson. "A hundred feet wide straight as an arrow with a railway grade. It is the most visionary extravagant piece of work imaginable."

Mr. Manson scored Premier Tolmie for allowing Hon. W. C. Shelly to remain in the cabinet after his charges against Norman Watt had been proved false. The whole investigation was an unnecessary expense, if Attorney-General Pooley had advised Mr. Shelly correctly on the law with regard to coroners' fees. Mr. Shelly had made a false statement that he knew of the coroners' fees when he dismissed Watt because it was not till six months afterwards that he wrote to the city clerk of Prince Rupert to ask if such fees had been paid to Watt.

"Why did he not try to collect from the other four government agents who accepted these fees?" asked Mr. Manson.

Debt Increased

Public debt had increased by \$21,000,000 to \$30,000,000 a year since the Tolmie government took office, declared Mr. Manson. Extravagance in large and small things was responsible. There were 192 more civil servants since August, 1928—an increased cost of \$300,000 a year by a government pledged to economy, he said. Liquor Board salaries of \$30,000, instead of \$12,000, an increase of \$70,000 in the liquor payroll in a year when receipts were down a million was not good business. Polished mahogany rulers imported from Austria, one of which he displayed in the House, gave no better service than the 15 cent variety he said. Here was a specimen of small extravagances.

The new universal one percent income tax made a double tax on the small wage earner who already paid poll tax of \$5. It had been hinted the poll tax would go. If it did the municipalities collecting that tax would lose more than their share of the educational grant from the new tax he calculated.

Stinging Indictment

For three hours, Mr. Manson grilled the government benches, carving his way into public accounts, public debt, departmental votes and ministerial preferences. Promises of political reform and elimination of patronage had been flouted, he charged. Jobs had been found for party friends and civil servants had been turned out without cause. The wonderful era of prosperity which had been envisioned three years ago from Conservative election platforms seemed remote indeed.

The largest cabinet in the history of the province, Mr. Manson asserted, had been seated with an increase of forty percent in the cost to the public. An audit of public accounts had been unnecessarily undertaken at a cost of \$50,000 and commissions had been appointed for purposes about which the public had heard nothing more. Civil servants to the number of 192 had been added in two years at a cost of \$300,000 yearly to the public. Friends of the government had been given positions on the Liquor Board at a cost of \$30,000 to the public as against \$12,000 heretofore. There had been a jump from more than \$4,500,000 to \$8,610,000 in current expenditures for the first three months of the year. Comparing the last year of Liberal rule and the last year of the present government, Mr. Manson said. There had been very serious padding of estimates, he asserted, and this would show, he said, when the public accounts were next presented. He believed that a deficit of from \$4,000,000 to \$5,000,000 would then be disclosed.

bond flotation of \$4,000,000, the sum of \$389,000 had been saved.

During yesterday's debate, University of British Columbia affairs came under discussion. Hon. Joshua Hinchcliffe, minister of education, answering queries as to why there had been no Rhodes scholars from the institution in recent years, pointed out that there were many brilliant students there who would have entered for the honor, feeling, however, that their athletic qualifications were not sufficient and being unable to afford to develop were some, too, who did not care to attend Oxford. Scholastic attainments of British Columbia students, Mr. Hinchcliffe felt, were amply attested to by the fact that they had taken various "scholarships" aggregating some \$337,000.

JAPANESE INFANT DIED IN HOSPITAL
